
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



ast year was one for the books — with good and bad turn of events.

A turbulent year was had globally between the war in Ukraine, droughts and flooding and the rise in inflation which continues to put many homes under pressure. There were also changes to EU legislation enforcing more red tape on Irish breeders and big changes ahead for Irish farmers in terms of clamping down on Climate change. Through tough times, breeders are a resilient lot and I've no doubt they will adapt and prevail.

I wish to extend my deepest sympathies to all who have lost loved ones during 2022. It seems to have been a year filled with tragic losses in the Hereford world and I wish everyone grieving the very best.

Equally, last year was one for the books in terms of bull sales. The year started much earlier than in recent years and saw a bumper year for selling Hereford bulls with sales remaining strong, prices remaining steady and strong bulls selling out early in the Spring. It appears to have had a positive effect on this year already with breeders reporting bull sales in January right across the country.

It was also a bumper year for selling Hereford Heifers with many breeders hosting successful production sales. It seems there is demand for good quality Hereford breeding females whereby new entrants are building up their herds or existing breeders are choosing to purchase quality over quantity. Congratulations to the Genetic Gems on running a hugely successful sale in November and breaking records with Gouldingpoll 1 Ravette who sold for $\square 22,000$.

shows were slow to make a comeback but Hereford numbers topped the numbers of many other breeds at most of the shows, highlighting the appreciation of breeders to be able to get back to the showring. On the back of the National Hereford Show - there were three bulls purchased by breeders in the UK. These can be thankless jobs at times but so necessary for the running of events that are so important to the promotion of Herefords and the development of the breed. Hosting a tour of Country Crest was a highlight for the team along with organising a webinar, Young Handler Competitions and a fundraising raffle which raised a profit of €5300 to put towards the hosting of events going forward. They teamed up with Irish Hereford Prime to run a calf rearing programme which is raising money for local charities and also showcasing the potential of Hereford cross calves from the dairy herd. The Youth is the key and without encouragement we cannot expect young people to be enthusiastic and instrumental in the driving forward of the breed. I wish to thank Catherine, Sinead, Eoin & Michael for their continued support and hard work.

I wish to extend thanks to Eileen, Noreen & the Council for their continued good work & dedication to the breed. I also wish to thank Tennyson Egar & Irish Hereford Prime for their continued support of both the Society. It is great to be working in tandem especially when the ultimate end goal remains the same.

Looking forward to 2023 – I think this year is going to be very promising for Hereford breeders. Bull sales have begun very early this year right across the country with dairy farmers jumping on the band wagon to ensure they are not left behind. 
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

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

There was great sadness in the mid Louth area in May 2022 at the passing of Brian at a young age. Similarly in his native Armagh where he continued to run the home drystock farm.

In 2004, he set up the Bellingham Herd in

Co. Louth with his wife Frances. He had a great passion and knowledge of cattle breeding and in addition to Herefords, he was also a very successful breeder of Pedigree Charolais, Limousin and Angus. He also ran a commercial suckler herd.

In his earlier years with his father, they ran the Kilcluney Hereford herd in Armagh. Brian and Frances exhibited their various breeds at many shows including Dundalk, Virginia, Mullingar, Tullamore and others. In 2018, their Hereford heifer Bellingham Nevin was National Young Heifer of the Year at Tullamore Show and was also awarded Overall Reserve Female Champion. In addition to the various Pedigree sales, Brian was also a regular at the various marts in the North East, selling and buying cattle for his own farm and many neighbours. Prior to his passing, Brian had arranged the Dispersal Sale of the Bellingham Herds at Carnaross Mart on May 28th. Sadly, his death occurred earlier the same week. Reflecting Brian's development of the herd, the sale was a huge success with record prices in each of the breeds. Brian will be sadly missed in farming circles.

To Brian's wife Frances, his children Grace and Peter and all the McKernan family, we extend our sincere sympathy.

This piece is about how my cousin and my husband worked together and started the Hereford herd in Coolnanoonagh. The late Philomena Buckley and I were joint owners of Coolnanoonagh, Tarbert. In the early eighties, my husband, the late James P Kissane had a bright idea to get involved with Herefords. Jimmy persuaded Phil to buy a whitehead (Hereford) cow called Camp Kitty. Three more soon followed, after which Coolnanoonagh became a Hereford Society Member. It was from there we started.

Together Phil, Jimmy and I worked together growing the herd over the years rearing calves, buying, and selling Herefords. I still remember, the first stock bull was bought in the Hereford sale in Kilmallock.

Over the last 40 years, the Herefords have proven to be a lovely, quiet breed who are easy to manage. Phil kept breeding them until she passed away in 2016. After which I took over with Jimmy's continued help until he passed away last year after a long illness. RIP.

Everything continued, typical of life on the farm until a quiet night in November, when five in calf cows were stolen under the cover of darkness. This has been a hard loss to take on top of a tough year. Now the Collnanoonagh herd is reduced to 19 cows and a bull called Victor. With these, I will continue, the Spring will come, the calves will arrive and the next chapter will begin.



Following the retirement of his father in 1975,

Norman continued to farm and in addition to the Hereford cattle he introduced Continental Breeding and later Aberdeen Angus to the herd.

Norman and his brother, John, were well known from travelling to shows and sales countrywide buying and selling pedigree bulls. Norman loved to meet fellow breeders and farmers and thoroughly enjoyed the chats at the ringside. Many of those he met became lifelong friends.

Norman was known for his sound judgement of cattle and this continued as he embraced modern technology and started trading online. Norman's love of and interest in cattle remained right up to the end of his life; just days before he died, he purchased eleven pedigree Hereford heifers which he had viewed online.

The long tradition of Hereford cattle continues in the Ashtree Herd with his son, Gordon. Norman is greatly missed by his wife Molly, sons Neville and Gordon, daughter Karen and their families.

PATRICIA SCOTT RIP

Patricia Scott of Knockfin, Rathdowney and formerly of Ballymullen, Abbeyleix, passed away peacefully on April 11th, 2022. One of the old reserves, she lived her life in close contact with her beloved

Herefords, be it with the Knockfin Herefords or the Ballymullen Herefords, the precursor to Athgreine Herefords. While formally known as Patricia, she would insist herself that she be called "Patsy" by all who knew her.

In her younger years, Patsy enjoyed playing the

piano and horse riding. Her first love however, was farming and she was often known to herd the cattle on horseback in Ballymullen. This love of farming led Patsy, along with her sister Lillie, to start up a new Pedigree Hereford herd known as the Ballymullen Herefords in 1951. It was also through the Herefords that Patsy came to meet her future husband Tim Scott of Knockfin.

In Knockfin, Patsy and Tim, who both had an eye for a good animal, looked after the famous Hereford bull Churchtown Miracle. In the pre-AI era, Patsy welcomed the breeders who came from all over the country to have their cows served by him, sometimes through the night, coming from as far away as Roscommon, Cavan and Wexford, in Massey 35's and cars with small trailers. There would be a queue of cows waiting for their turn on any given morning. Miracle had an exceptional breeding career, and along with his son Knockfin Pirate (who calved at 7 months and spent his first 6 weeks warmed beside the Aga in Patsy's kitchen), they started blood lines that produced numerous champions down through the years.


Patsy, alongside her husband Tim and son Francis, shared many happy days attending agricultural shows and sales, especially the Rathdowney show, and competing with fellow breeders for the Scott Perpetual Trophy. They received the top price on many occasions at the RDS Spring Shows & Sales in the 1960's and 1970's, received champion Hereford Bull at Kilkenny bull Sales numerous times and won show Championships down through the years.

Patsy was a strong woman who wouldn't let anything best her. While suffering from poor health in later years, she showed true grit and courage in overcoming her obstacles and remained as passionate as ever about her interest in all things farming. She was comforted and blessed in the surroundings of her family, which now included her 4 grandchildren; Patricia, Tim, John Paul and Helena.

In her final years, Patsy was delighted to see the Knockfin herd carrying on to the next generation in the care of her beloved son Francis and grandson Tim.

Patsy's family are eternally grateful to her and she will forever remain within their memory for nothing loved is ever lost, and she was loved so much.

TOM HARRINGTON RIP



Tom Harrington RIP

Tom was born on the 2nd of January 1937 at Lacken, Rahara, County Roscommon and died on the 23rd of January 2022. Tom ran his own pedigree Hereford Herd. Tom's life revolved around Hereford cattle. The first pedigree heifer was purchased in 1956 by Toms's father William Harrington from Val McDonnell, Lacken House, County Roscommon. Willie, as he was known assisted annually at the lambing for Val McDonnell. He liked his big strong Hereford cows with their wonderful bags of milk. These cows were

never housed but they had acres of land to run over.

Willie liked one heifer Val was very reluctant to sell and but for their great relationship he would not sell her. However, when he agreed to sell it was on the basis that he would buy a second heifer. This he agreed to do to get the good one. However, the second heifer he decided was not good enough to breed pedigree cattle and she was culled commercial. His choice was called Lacken Queen Regnant, NB/M3 by Bawn Killindini by Killoughter Bird, many times champion at the RDS. Killindini was from a very good line of females. Queen Regnant had to be milked daily after calving for 6 weeks. Queen Regnant Dam Lacken Ida by Cloverhill Start by Vern Statesman by Tarrington Sergeant. Ida was a massive cow with an abundance of milk. Cloverhill Start was exported to England. Queen Regnant went down with Brucellosis carrying her 14th calf. Brucellosis was raging in those days. Her 1st calf, Kilnagralta Beauty by Cloncroff Pilot (P.Kealy) was by Marlow Pilot by Tarrington Debonair prize winner in Carrick on Shannon and sold for 105 gns to Joe Donnelly, Rahara, Co. Roscommon. The bull went home the next day by train to Knockcroghery station and was walked to Rahara on the road some 6 miles. A feature of this line was how good they were on their legs.

In 1961, her bull calf 3rd at the RDS was sold to Hill Bros, Shercock, Co. Cavan for 510 gns. He bred the highest priced group of bulls 2 years later at the RDS. This Queen family bred consistently yearly. A daughter by the Hereford Champion in England – Field Sailor was described by the late Bill Carlos, Dept Agriculture Chief as the Best Female he ever saw and she would have made a record price at the time to a client of his. She was considered too valuable to leave the farm. Her 1st bull calf was sold to Mr. Max Kilroy for North Western Cattle Breeding Society for A.I. at 825 gns where he bred very well. No A.I. was allowed in those days for pedigree use. This Queen line bred Champions and prize winners all over the country,

including female of the year. Samson from this line sold to North Western Cattle Breeding Society for A.I. for 5,500 gns.

Tom had a great love for this Queen family, he used to say "it never misses". I am pleased that all the Queen family were left to me by Paddy and Tom and will be coming to Ballinafad House. They will be mated here to the top bulls worldwide to maintain this top family in Paddy and Tom's memory. Kilnagralta Kevin was exported to John Douglas in Scotland from the Queen Family. In a recent interview with the Farmers Journal, John Douglas stated "that Kevin had a huge influence on his herd, producing top females and putting more muscle and meat into his cattle". Paddy and Tom also exported cattle to Denmark. These cattle produced prize winners in Denmark also.

Bulls used in the Herd:

Beaghmore Pirate, Trewaren Goldfinch, Ardnapondra Capital. Strandard Krishnager 9X (tracing to Tarrington). He was Calgary Champion, one of the very best female breeders with a lot of end and milk. He was traced to Westhide, all Tarrington breeding. Haleton Valiant, purchased by the Dept at Hereford in England. He would make the biggest bulls of today look small. Mr. Richard Milner told me that he was the one bull he regretted not buying. Churchtown Miracle - RDS Champion and top breeder. Kilternan Prince – by Halton Valiant, Dam Super cow by Churchtown Miracle. Brackford Vanguard by Freetown Vanguard by Freetown Monarch, all Tarrington line. Vanguard left wonderful females. Standard Lad 93 J – Canadian, one of the most influential Canadian bulls. He lifted every herd around the world. Dardistown Uncle by 93 J, Gageboro Sauve, CH 3223 Visa ET 57X, Standard Britisher 20N, left wonderful cows with lots of milk. GM Taurus British 3E, Canadian left lovely hind quarters by Wenlock Beamish by Wenlock Taurus, again Tarrington breeding. Kenmare Ivo. Lisnalurg Vincible, from a very good female line. Yarram Pompeii, Australian, bred consistently well. Dunrobin Superstar ET 2A, one of the top

Canadian bulls ever to come to Europe. He was from 3 exceptional females on his Dams side.

The Finola Family:

I spotted a nice bull calf at Lady Grovenors place in Kenmare, Killarney in August 1971. He was shown at Nenagh Agricultural Show and place 7th in the class. At a reduction sale of Lady Grovenor in September, I bought this calf called 'Kenmare Ivo' for 220 gns. Late that night, I arrived home with my purchase to see who was waiting for me Paddy, Tom and my late mother. They were absolutely astonished with the standard of the calf. The following February he was 1st prize at the RDS and sold for 1800 gns, more than the combined price of the Champion and Reserve together, to the Dept of Agriculture. He bred outstanding, by Wenlock Randolf (full of Tarrington breeding).

Kenmare Finola, Dam of Ivo, a beautiful cow and had an udder like a Holstein cow, lovely head and breed character. Tom bought her for 520 gns the top price at Lady Grovenor's Dispersal Sale and went specially to buy her. She was by Culnagrew Tarquin Champion at Belfast by Wenlock Ruskin tracing to one of the best females at Wenlock "Tiara", full of Tarrington breeding - the Great 'March On'. Her dam 'Garnston Bounteous (Harper) from the great Kilcleagh Bounteous Family. This cow bred prize winners and Champions all over the country. A.I. could not be used by the Hereford Society. We (Paddy and Tom) thought it could be a valuable tool and we kept pressure on the Society to allow A.I. to be used, finally they agreed. A bull called New Inn Snowman spotted in a paddock at Bandon A.I. Truly one of the finest ever seen with power, bone and massive head. Immediately straws of this bull were purchased. He was used on 2 cows. The one 'Kenmare Finola' she produced a bull calf and he was RDS Champion and a massive calf with power and bone. Snowman was by Haleton Valiant.

The Finola family bred outstanding daughters with lots of milk and many top bulls, a very fertile line. The Finola family came to Frank. I hope to

maintain this family and will be mated to the top bulls. It is interesting to note that a delegation of breeders from Canada visited the Kilnagralta Herd some years ago. After spending 10 days in Ireland, they expressed the view that the Kilnagralta females were the best that they had seen with their consistency and wonderful udders. One of these was Jim Hole (93] breeder) and he was most impressed with the cattle and with the green grass on the farm. Tom was a real Hereford enthusiast. He also officiated as Judge at many shows both cattle and sheep. He was never afraid to voice his opinion whether you liked it or not, perhaps a characteristic of the Harrington's. Tom was a frequent visitor to Ballinafad House always inspecting my stock for sales and purchases. A word of praise from Tom had to be earned. One of his last visits here was to inspect the bull F.H. Noel ET, sold to Progressive Genetics. He considered him the Best Bull of any breed he ever saw.

Tom used to say 'If you don't know your animal with one look, you don't know him at all'. He will be sadly missed, take him for all and all, we shall not look upon his likes again. Frank Harrington

HALL OF FAME

r. John Ludgate of Fortfarm Herefords was awarded the National Hall

of Fame Award in 2022 on behalf of the Irish Hereford Breed Society.

The Fortfarm Herd was founded by John in the early 1960's. The first calf registered was Fortfarm Fancy born in 1963. A heifer calf out of Springville Fancy bred by the Roycroft family, Dunmanway and sired by Ballintrim Major. In 1964 Fortfarm Valiant was the first bull calf registered. This bull

was by Springmount Valiant and out of a female Kilgubban Countess bred by John's brother Tom.

A recognised judge of the breed John has officiated on numerous occasions and is recognised as an astute cattleman. A dedicated member of the Munster Branch of the Society he just recently following 30 years of service as its trusted treasurer.

From the outset the aim was to put emphasis on quality rather than on quantity. Quality females were added to the herd usually purchased at realistic prices when the opportunity arose at Society sales. One such purchase was a young heifer from the well-established Clonwhelan herd of R & L White, Clonwhelan House, Edgeworthstown, Co Longford. Prior to purchase she had been recently mated to Ballyholey Famous. The resulting calf a heifer which was named "Fortfarm Judy". The first of several quality offspring "Judy" went on to win at RDS and was Queen of the show circuit winning whenever and wherever exhibited. Her first bull calf was Fortfarm Judo was awarded Supreme Champion at the Society's Premier Spring Show & Sale then (1979)

held at Goff's Sale complex in Co Kildare. The judge on that occasion was Mr Roger Snell one of the foremost Hereford cattle breeders in the UK. At the sale following "Judo" was purchased at 2,200 by the Irish Department of Agriculture and joined the stud at Dovea AI station where he went on to be a most successful sire producing several champions and many successful herd sires. That Clonwhelan bred dam has had a strong influence on the development of the herd in the intervening years.

Bulls in more recent years were sold for the most part to repeat customers who returned again and again. Heifers considered of lesser quality than desired are sold commercially or for slaughter in order to maintain and improve the overall quality of the herd. Herd sires purchased were carefully selected on bloodlines and type.

Advancing years prompted the reluctant dispersal sale of the herd in Autumn 2019 which was met with very satisfactory demand at Kanturk Mart. Females from the herd were purchased as foundation animals for new herds which is very encouraging.





as Texas in America. These cattle bred extremely well in America, and the customers in America wanted to come back and buy more from Frank and Elizabeth."

"However, unfortunately, the American government stopped the export of bovine animals from Europe after the BSE crisis."






































SPRING CALF SALES REPORTS 2022



HEREFORD CROSS CALF SALES ON FIRE ONCE AGAIN!

ereford calves were on fire once again during Spring 2022 with top prices of \(\text{\text{380}}\) being achieved for Hereford cross bull calves across Irish marts during January.

Hereford bull calves made up on □380 in GVM Kilmallock & Hereford Heifer calves made up on □370 in Carnaross Mart.

The same strong trade was seen in Bandon where Hereford bulls sold for the tops of □375 & Hereford heifers made □325. There was good trade in

Carrigallen also when Hereford cross calves sold for up on □340.

There were nearly 300 calves on offer during Carnaross Mart's second sale in February. One of the top prices on the day went to a late November 2021-born Hereford-cross heifer which sold for 500. Another November born Hereford cross heifer sold for 400 on the day also.

During the calf sale in Kilmallock on 14th February, Hereford cross calves were on a high with a Hereford bull calf topping the Hereford trade at $\Box 410$.

Carnew Mart held its weekly calf sale on February 12th which saw over 360 calves presented for sale. A number of marts at that stage had begun displaying dam breed for calves being sold.

Commenting on this, the Carnew mart manager said: "Displaying the dam's breed on the board really gave buyers more confidence when buying calves". Good coloured calves were in high demand with Hereford-cross bull calves selling for between 280 and 360.

During the same week in Cootehill Mart in Cavan, it was reported that one 15-day old Hereford bull calf made □320.

The Hereford whiteface gives a great advantage over other breeds and the confidence to farmers that they are purchasing what 'it says on the tin' but also that they're buying a good, growthy calf that will thrive and produce good carcase weights.

As reported by Declan Marren in the Irish Farmers Journal on 26th February – Hereford heifers were consistently running \$\Pi\$5-\$\Pi\$20/head above Angus heifers with the average price being \$\Pi\$206. Threeweek-old bull calves that week averaged at \$\Pi\$260 for Herefords also.

There were two Hereford cross Bull Calves born on the 7th and 9th February that sold for 405 each at GVM Kilmallock as reported on GVM Group Facebook page February 23rd.

Waterford Ross mart held their weekly calf sale on Saturday 26th February. The final section of the sale contained the Hereford sired calves that were on offer at the sale. The bull calves sold from □30 up to a top call of □350, while the heifers on offer sold from □100 to □330. Commenting on the trade overall, Richard said: "The quality of calves on offer this week was a lot better, with a lot less of those softer plainer calves on offer. "There was a noticeable increase of customers back at ring side with the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions with the Saturday mart really suiting the part-time farmers."

Demand for Hereford cross calves continued into March with prices remaining steady.

Prices relaxed a small bit for calves as supply began to meet demand but there were still great prices achieved for Hereford sired calves in Bandon with the top stronger calves selling for $\square 30$ and the majority selling for between $\square 50 - \square 260$. At the sale, Tommy Moyles commented that there was little appetite for calves under 50kgs.

The average price report in this week's Irish Farmer Journal dated Saturday 5th March saw a drop in the average price for Hereford calves which would be usual for this time of year with the surge of calves coming out for sale. Despite this, Hereford calves held their own with three-week-old bull calves averaging at □244 and the same aged heifer calves averaging at □88.



'SUCKLER FARMERS IN IRELAND ARE AMONG THE BEST IN THE WORLD'

hat's Farming, spoke to Edward Roe, Co Tipperary, the Macra na Feirme/FBD Drystock Farmer of the Year 2022. He discusses entering an official farm partnership with his father, polled genetics, the benefits of bonuses and his outlook on the future of Irish suckler farming.

When the Roe family from Roscrea, County Tipperary faced a Brucellosis outbreak in their 40-cow dairy herd in 2002, alongside a suckler herd, they bought in store cattle, and brought this to beef. While you could say the enterprise changed from dairy to beef production, but one factor that has not is the family's long-standing association with pedigree Hereford cattle.

Following a clear test result, Lester, and his grandfather, Edward, maintained this link in the family by investing in breeding females from various dispersal sales to rebuild numbers.

Today, the family farm around 54 Hereford-cross, Angus-cross, Limousin-cross, Simmental-cross, and Shorthorn-cross cattle, including 11 pedigree Hereford cows on 210-acres.

"In 2018, I entered an official farm partnership with my father, Lester. For three years, I also worked in a big feedlot, Bar-J Ranch Guest Ranch, in Canada," he told *That's Farming*

"I did my first year in Gurteen Agricultural College before that, took a break, went to Canada, came back to Ireland." "In 2017, I undertook the Teagasc Distance Education Green Cert Programme course for my second year as I was working."

Until last May, he worked full-time off the farm on a neighbour's 300-cow dairy enterprise during weekdays mornings and evenings.

However, his wife has since secured employment, and he now works full-time on the farm.

Tipperary suckler farmer

The family select the Hereford breed because of its low maintenance as a "low-cost input animal", its early finishing period, and the bonus structure scheme through Irish Hereford Prime.

Their ideal cow possesses desirable maternal characteristics, is easy calved, medium-sized and circa 660kgs.

For around the last three years, Lester's son, Edward, a trained DIY AI technician AIs cows over a 6-week period.

He uses a team of four different Hereford stock bulls to mop up, which is a result of the farm's fragmentation and means one bull per group of cows in each land parcel.

In their AI programme, they only select polled Hereford, Angus, and Simmental bulls, and started using these genetics around three years ago. "We find the advantages of using polled genetics are there is less stress on the animal, less work for me without the loss of a quality animal, plus it is an extra selling point when selling our pedigree bulls."

"There are some very good AI straws available. Still, we are limited at one point because, in my view, the majority of Hereford straws are aimed at the dairy industry."

"Most of the bulls would be very easy calving; some are great animals, but in my opinion, they do not grow to the size of animals we like."

Calving

Due to housing requirements, they calf their cows for five months of the year, commencing on December 1st.

The second advantage is that it allows Edward to AI cows from February 20th during the housing period.

According to the family, cows require "very little intervention" and they use Wi-Fi-powered calving cameras connected to their mobile phones to enhance management.

According to the family, the herd's calving interval is 353 days. They strive for a "good animal but easy calving and aim to make that balance".

The family aims for pedigree and commercial heifers to calf at 24-months-old.

"I found that the longer an animal is without a calf, the more it costs you, making it less viable."

Progeny

The family slaughter bullocks at an average of 24-months-old at 700kgs live weight and heifers 21-months-old at 600kg live weight, with the latter grading R=4-s and bullocks grading R=3+.

According to the family, the farm feeds threequarters of cattle on a grass-based diet, which achieves their respective breed and quality assurance bonuses.

"I find bonuses open you up to a new market. For example, if you did not have a quality assurance bonus, you would not have as much of a market."

"I will admit that this year has been tougher than most years with input costs, but we look around and save on fertiliser and meal, where we can be more efficient.

The family are toying with various options to reduce input costs and are currently researching the

Supersoil chemical-free fertiliser to counteract bills.

They retain pedigree Hereford replacement heifers and sell three-quarters of bulls to dairy farmers and the rest to suckler farmers on-farm.

When choosing up to 15 replacements, they place many of their choices on a high replacement index figure, conformation, locomotion, fleshing abilities and data.

"We never had a problem selling any bulls, and this year we sold seven bulls."

Grassland management and the future of Irish suckler farming

In the last six years, the family have implemented a paddock-based system and a stricter grazing schedule and recently purchased a plate meter to measure grass in the future.

Edward – who clinched the Drystock Farmer of the Year 2022 at the FBD Young Farmer of the Year

Awards – hopes to improve the farm into the future. "I was very honoured to win it and know there were a lot of other good drystock farmers in it as well."

While the herd has gradually expanded since Edward joined forces with the family, the aim is to reach 80 suckler cows.

The family can sustain these cow numbers on their current land base as they sell off surplus silage. "I find that suckler farmers in Ireland are among the best in the world, so we need to stick our ground and show we are doing the best we can."

"We are doing everything we can to take care of the environment around us and produce highquality beef," the suckler farmer concluded.


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


IHBS AUCTIONEER - EAMONN GAFFNEY

ou can't become an auctioneer you have to be born one" -Eamonn shares a quote from a long-time friend and it seems no truer words have been spoken.

The Irish Hereford Breed Society are delighted to officially welcome Eamonn Gaffney as Society Auctioneer. Hailing from Corlismore, Co. Cavan - Eamonn grew up on a dairy farm with his mother, father and two sisters. He took over the family farm at the age of 18 years old which then consisted of 12 dairy cows and three suckler cows. Eamonn developed the farm and grew the herd over 100 dairy cows today. This growth was enabled through leasing and purchasing land and inheriting an out farm from his uncle. Something he has done since he could walk – Eamonn's first love is milking cows and subsequently where he does his thinking.

The lovely Aishling moved into Corlismore in 2017 and the couple were married. They now have three beautiful children; Ellie who is four years old and by all accounts the boss of the house, Ned who is 22 months old and rearing to get going on the farm & Peggy Sue is 8 months old and finding her feet. Eamonn studied at Ballyhaise Agricultural College when he finished school, where he obtained the Green Certificate. Eamonn's enthusiasm for farming and studying paid off when he received the Student of the Year award for Grassland Management in year one and Student of the Year for the three-year course which was presented by Mary Robinson in the RDS, the then President of Ireland. In his early years; Eamonn played Senior football for Cornafean for 20 years & went onto taking the seat of chairman for the club for five and a half years. Eamonn also competed in the Scor dancing competition from the age of seven years old.



The Cavan natives off-farm career began in 2001 when he began working for Progressive genetics as an AI technician - a job Eamonn always wanted from a young age. After completing the initial training, he worked as an AI technician for one and a half years. He also worked alongside Johnny Flynn training up farmers in DIY AI which was taking off at that time. The job progressed then into servicing AI flasks for Progressive Genetics in Louth, Meath, North Dublin, Monaghan, Leitrim, Longford and Cavan where Eamonn was living his dream while meeting farmers from across the country.

This career path led Eamonn to one of his career highlights to date which was hosting and auctioneering the Skiddoo Pedigree Charolais

dispersal sale in September 2019. Eamonn serviced the flasks for the Skiddoo herd for years and when approached by farm manager Donal Callery to host the sale - he was elated. With help in the office from his wife Aishling and Carmel O'Reilly from along with a great team of drovers managing the yard - the sale was a huge success. The highlight of the day came when lot 25, Skidoo 96 Highlight 2 ET traded at \Box 9,800. Overall, all 34 in calf cows calving in autumn sold to average over \Box 3,700. The team sold 123 lots of cattle in record time of just four and half hours.

Eamonn has a real passion for auctioneering. It all began with a charity auction for the local Cornafean ladies GAA club when he was asked to auction a signed Crossmaglen Jersey. The next move was to auction at the annual race night fundraiser for Cornafean GAA club. The real break came from Ms. Helen Kells, the mart manager in GVM Carrigallen in 2011. Helen gave Eamonn great encouragement and offered him his first livestock sale in Carrigallen where the novice sold 34 lots of strong calves. His first sale & it went off without a hitch - he was on cloud nine. The next sale did not go quite as well but Eamonn didn't give up and neither did Helen. Through the ups and downs, Eamonn persevered and the livestock auctioneering really took off in 2012 and 2013 where Eamonn started to sell weanling bulls and heifers. His current weekly sales include; Monday & Saturday in Carrigallen, Cavan mart on Friday and Cootehill mart on Friday evening. Eamonn also conducts the commercial Simmental Cross sale in Ballymote mart and has done so for the past six years. He has also auctioneered in Granard mart, the popular Herbie's Heifer sale in Carrigallen and the Carrick Winter Fair where he sold the highest priced animal last November at □4,500 - 330kg BBX heifer - another great highlight of his career. Auctioneering opened the door for Eamonn to move into the line of TB valuations on farms also a process which must be tendered for and employed by the Department of Agriculture.

In 2014, Eamonn progressed onto property

auctioneering when he was approached by a local farmer who offered his own lands for sale. Gaffney Auctioneers took on the sale and it turned out to be a great success which led to the following sale of the parochial house in Cornea. Eamonn went on to host the sale of 86-acre farm in Granard, Co. Longford. The sale was held on the farm which was quite a rustic approach at the time but a must given the covid-19 lockdown and proved to be a great success.

When asked about his proudest accomplishment -Eamonn is proud of what he has achieved in recent years, in particular rearing his family.

Eamonn is motivated by the enjoyment of the work that he does and doing it well as he quotes - "if you do what you love, you'll never work a day in your life". Eamon has a passion for doing his best for both the farmers and the people who he works for. Eamonn really enjoyed his baptism of fire last year when he stepped into the boots of Society Auctioneer in Spring 2022. The sales went well for both him and the breeders which gave everyone a great boost. The Autumn sale in Kilmallock in particular was a flyer and a very enjoyable sale.

Eamonn is looking forward to the challenge of the job and being part of the development of the breed. Eamonn commented that Herefords are really at the top of the scale in terms of demand and it's great to see. The Herefords lost their place down through the years when the continentals became the end all and be all but they are finally back to where they belong. The growing dairy market has helped their position and will mostly likely continue to do so. In terms of sustainability and climate change action - Herefords are a no brainer! Following six weeks of Friesian AI in the dairy herd - the auctioneer finishes the mating season with a Hereford bull and he is delighted with the calves produced stating they were good growthy calves which sold well for while giving the purchaser a quality calf to make a few euro from too.




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

There are many advantages of using this method including; more flexibility with donors, one semen straw can be used on upto eight donors, can be carried out without the use of hormones and it is more welfare friendly for the donor – to name just a few. COUNTRY CREST FARM TOUR -APRIL 2022



The Next Gen Herefords organised a tour of the Country Crest farm on Sunday 24th April. The tour was hosted by the owner of the farm and company; Gabriel Hoey and the cattle farm manager; Niall Maguire. The weather was favourable for the day with a mild easterly breeze but plenty of sunshine.

The group were given a very warm welcome by



Gabriel and Niall on arrival. Gabriel gave a run through where the business began. Gabriel and his brother; Michael left school at an early age and began farming on 65 acres. Together, they worked hard and built the business upto what it is today. The operation at Country Crest currently consists of a tillage enterprise, cattle enterprise and convenience foods enterprise. They are currently finishing 2,000 head cattle each year alongside their





Pedigree Hereford and Pedigree Angus herd. The core of this business is the tillage enterprise where they mainly grow cereals with circa 300 acres of potatoes and 100 acres of onions. Country Crest are the sole suppliers of onions to Tesco and circa 96% of the potatoes grown on farm are sold to the domestic market. The Hoey family also run Ballymaguire Farm foods which produces between 16 and 20 million ready meals each year. Overall, Country Crest currently employ 400 staff which is considerable growth for the Hoey family over the past 40 years. The group were introduced to several farm managers and employees on the day who are instrumental in the running of such a successful business. Gabriel spoke about how it is important for young people to be educated and that leaving school early is not the answer but also how important it is for every young person to realise and use the gifts they possess.

The farm manager, Niall Maguire, then gave a detailed overview of the cattle farm before taking the group on a farm walk through the feedlot. The feedlot is mainly filled with Limousin and Charolais Cross heifers. The company used to finish traditional bred cattle off grass but this year they decided against that given the margins involved. Niall stressed that if something does not work it's important to change and adapt. Niall discussed the diet of the finishing cattle and the importance of minerals in the diets. When cattle are bought in, they are quarantined, weighed, dosed and vaccinated before joining the main group. Lighter stock is let out to grass for a time until they make the weight of 550kgs when they will then be housed and finished. Cattle are generally slaughtered after 70 days in the herd or 60 days depending on Bord Bia Quality Assurance requirements.









Following the tour of the feedlot the group walked through the farm to take a look at the pedigree Hereford herd. The herd is relatively new - made up of Ballyaville bred dams and crossed with Moyclare Phoenix to produces this year's crop of calves. The aim for the herd is quality not quantity – the Hoey's want to run a small herd of top-quality Hereford cattle.













The Hoey family were very generous and laid out an excellent spread for lunch for the whole group. After lunch, the group were given a tour of the heifers that were recently purchased and were out at grass. The group also saw the Pedigree Angus herd and their new Angus stock bull. To top off the farm walk we saw the herd of Highland cattle which currently reside on the farm also.

The Hoey's again treated the group to tea/coffee and cakes and a chance to chit chat before the group dispersed.

Many thanks are extended to the Hoey family, Niall Maguire and the staff of Country Crest for welcoming us into their yard and farm and pulling out all the stops along the way. The group had a great day and was more than impressed with the operation at Country Crest. We wish the Hoey family continued success with all their endeavours.



HEREFORDS HELPING HONOURABLE CHARITIES!

Next Gen Herefords & Irish Hereford Prime have teamed up to facilitate the Irish Hereford Charity Calf Rearing Program which is encouraging young people to rear calves on their home farms with the added aim of raising money for charity.

How does it work?

In Spring 2022, Over €5,500 was allocated to five of the Hereford Society branches. This money was kindly donated by Irish Hereford Prime and has gone towards the buying and maintaining of HEX dairy cross bull calves by Young Hereford breeders who were appointed by their local branches. Each calf must be male, genotyped and must be disbudded and castrated.

The real journey began in March and April when the calves were purchased from local dairy farmers or dairy farmers within each young person's region. Once in their new home, the calves were then taken under the wings of a young Hereford breeder who has been busy since then rearing & tending to their calf.

Every young handler, on top of feeding & rearing the calf, halter trained and prepared their animal for showing at the Next Gen Herefords Youth Competition and National Hereford Calf Show in GVM Tullamore in November 2022. This was the first day out for the animals and they were a great asset to young handlers who wished to show smaller, well-trained cattle in the show.

Helping honourable charities

Each of the animals involved in this program will be reared onto their second year. In 2023, the cattle will be sold at a live auction with full proceeds being donated to a charity of the young breeders or the branches choice.










Meet the Young Breeders


MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS CIARAN KINAHAN

Hailing from Co. Offaly, Ciaran Kinahan has been selected to rear a calf by the North Leinster Hereford branch. Ciaran is no stranger to farming, as he is heavily involved on his family farm in Tubber.

Ciaran is involved in the running of a pedigree Hereford and Simmental herd, alongside his father Michael. The father-andson duo are very active within showing circles – showcasing their pedigree Hereford and Simmental cattle at agricultural shows up and down the country.

Ciaran is currently working full-time within the agricultural sector and has a strong interest in all things agricultural related.

He has worked in many farming enterprises over the years. Before that, he studied Environmental Science in Agriculture at Technological University of the Shannon (TUS).

Away from the farm, Ciaran loves to play football for his local club Tubber.

Love for Herefords

Ciaran outlined why the family choose the Hereford breed and the traits they seek in their ideal breeding females.

"My love for sucklers has come from my father as he has a huge passion for sucklers". From a young age Ciaran was always involved on the farm and his favourite time of the year is when cows start calving. "My love for Hereford cattle came from my father as his choice of suckler cow was a black-white head. We rear 10-15 HEX heifer calves every year and select four or five of the calves for replacements, the heifers that don't make the grade are sold for further feeding.

My father and I love the Hereford cross dam for its qualities of hardiness, docility, milking ability and ease of management.

Hereford cattle are very easily handled which is very important to me, and they are very easy fleshing. Overall, they are lovely cattle to work with."

Ciaran's ideal suckler cow type is a female that is medium and correct, has a good head and top, is easy fleshing, produces a lot of milk, and weighs between 700kg and 800kg when she is a mature cow. Ciaran noted that on the farm 'it is crucial for a cow to give birth to a calf every year.'

"On our farm, we currently have 25 breeding cows and we use 100% artificial insemination (AI). We will maintain this number of breeding cows, with an emphasis on quality rather than quantity. We concentrate on AI because it gives us access to a variety of genetically superior, vetted bulls and allows us to choose the right bull for each individual cow.

'I am honoured to have been chosen to raise a calf for the North Leinster Hereford branch as it is for such a great cause.'

'It's wonderful to see Irish Hereford Prime and Next Gen collaborating on this super program as it's for a charitable purpose.'

'When the calf is fit to sell, the charity in which I wish to donate the money too will be Hooves 4 Hospice. The money raised will help go towards the fundraising project to raise vital funds towards the cost of building the planned Midland Regional Hospice."

MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS TARA & ELISA DRUMM



Meet the Drumm family, hailing from "The Lake" county of Co. Westmeath. The Drumm family has a strong tradition of showing quality pedigree Hereford cattle at many shows in the Midlands. Mother Christine and Daughters Tara and Elisa are never too far away from the show ring come the summer months.

Tara and Elisa Drumm have been selected to rear a Hereford bull calf by the North Leinster Hereford Branch. Tara and Elisa are no strangers to the showing circles where they spend most Sundays during the summer, showing their pedigree Hereford animals alongside their mother Christine. The Drumm family own the well-known Crowenstown Herd.

The herd consists of 60 commercial cows alongside 10 pedigree Hereford cows. The pedigree herd uses 100% AI on their cows. The girls choose 100%

AI as it allows the herd to use selective mating of cows/heifers to select sires strong on particular traits such as easy calving bulls on heifer and optimising the genetics of the herd.

The Drumm girls love the Hereford breed as they are a very docile animal, easy to maintain and the commercial animals kill-out well in the factory. The family has a strict breeding policy currently in place, their ideal cow type is a good feminine cow with a good top line, well made around the back end and a foot in every corner is what the girls look for when selecting a future cow.


The girls love competing in the young handlers and last year Tara won the Junior young handlers and Elisa won the Intermediate young handlers at the Next Gen Hereford Calf show in Tullamore. The girls love competing in the young handlers and they love competing against each other, they have really

missed exhibiting their Herefords at shows due to Covid and they really enjoyed the 2022 showing season.

Away from farming Elisa plays Hurling for the local club; Delvin and Tara plays soccer for her local soccer club. They love farming but playing sports helps them get away from the farm and meet their friends.

Speaking about the calf, the calf is a lovely red and white Hereford bull calf who has been sourced locally. After a lot of discussion and thought the girls decided to name their calf Logan. The girls are honoured to be rearing a calf for charity and were delighted to be asked by the North Leinster Hereford branch to take on the task. The girls said that "We are really looking forward to seeing how Logan develops and think it's a great idea in which Irish Hereford Prime thought of".

MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS -CHARLIE & ADAM MCKENNA

Irish Hereford Prime visited the farm of Adam and Charlie Mc Kenna from Glaslough, Co, Monaghan.

Adam is 10 and Charlie is four years old and they were selected by the Cavan/Monaghan Hereford Branch to rear two Hereford cross bull calves for charity. Father Padraic, is a full-time farmer who runs a 50 cow-suckler herd. Alongside the suckler herd, Padraic runs a turkey enterprise and runs a

contracting business within the local area. Padraic said "when his first son Adam was born he was going to purchase a pedigree heifer" which led him to his journey of pedigree Hereford cattle.

Love for Herefords

The Lisgoagh herd is no stranger to the pedigree circles as they are very active at shows across the country and selling bulls and heifers at pedigree sales. The herd currently consists of 50 suckler

cows, which includes 10 pedigree Hereford cows. The love for Herefords came from a very young age as Padraic always loved helping his grandfather feed calves. Charlie and Adam's great grandfather suck-calf of choice to rear was the Hereford calf from the Friesian cow. The passion and love for Herefords is really in the blood.

The McKenna's farm has a very strict breeding policy currently in place. The Mc Kenna's ideal cow type is a medium-sized cow, easy on the eye, soft fleshing, has enough milk to rear a calf and have a good pelvis to have a decent-sized calf. They choose pedigree Hereford cattle due to their docility of the cow and ease of management which was very evident on the farm. Herefords are the number one suckler cow choice on farm.

At the moment, Padraic has seen a huge market for Hereford bulls in the dairy herd as they are ticking all the boxes for dairy farmers. Dairy farmers are choosing Hereford bulls as they are easy calving, short gestation, a strong market for the calves and

the bulls are robust for big cow herds. In the last few years, Padraic has seen more suckler farmers using a Hereford bull on their herd which is very positive for the Hereford breed.

"Teaming up with Irish Hereford Prime to rear calves for charity is a great idea" – when Padraic first heard about it he was very keen on the idea of rearing the calves for charity. It's a great way of raising much-needed funds for charity but it is also a great incentive to get Charlie and Adam interested in the farm as it is their project.

The Monaghan family have chosen LA519 as their

charity which is a Monaghan based non-profit organisation set up to raise awareness about suicide, work on suicide prevention and support families and members of the community who have been bereaved by suicide.



MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS -JOHN CREGAN

John Cregan is 8 years old and is a second class student in Scoil Mhuire National School in Broadford Co. Limerick. John lives with his parents; Tommy and Maura Cregan, his brother Peadar and his sisters Ellie and Molly. The family run the Tullaha Hereford herd which was established by Johns Great grandfather, James Neenan in 1971.

John started going to shows at very young age with his late Grandfather John Neenan and he began to show cattle himself in the young handler class for the first time in 2022, winning several red rosettes across the Summer.

John loves all things farming but he has a special love for Herefords. John knows the breeding of many of the Herefords on the farm and keeps a watchful eye over new born calves especially. Herefords are an ideal breed for young John given they're so docile and easy to handle Johns' favourite past times include playing GAA, Showing Hereford cattle and supporting the

Limerick hurlers. John had some very difficult decisions to make last summer as he had to decide between going to a show on a Sunday or going to watch Limerick on their way to win 3 in a row. As a result of some good decision making, he ended up having a very successful summer both in the show ring and in Croke Park.

Johns' chosen charity is The Jack and Jill foundation. Jack and Jill is a nationwide charity providing in-home nursing care and respite support for children up to the age of 6 with severe to profound neurodevelopmental delay. This may include children with brain injury, genetic diagnosis, cerebral palsy, and undiagnosed

Ardlahan Herefords

Ardlahan Herefords started in 1997 when Paddy, Conor's grandfather, bought three maiden heifers from Tom Hannon of Hannonstown Herefords. Conor & his brother Noah are now 3rd generation Hereford breeders & the herd has now built up to 12 Pedigree breeding cows.

The Farm & Herefords

Conor purchased his first Pedigree registered Hereford heifer this year from John O'Connor of Clouncagh Herefords. The heifer has calved down since with twins last August gone & Conor is excited to see the calves grow into potential breeding stock going forward. Conor will spend time online checking out bulls to cross with the Ardlahan cows and knows the names and star evaluations of almost every Hereford bull in AI. The O'Rourke's also rear 50 Hereford cross heifer calves each year which Conor is highly involved in.

Conor was a big help during the National Hereford Show last year and was delighted with his day at the show.

Love of GAA

Along with breeding Herefords, Conor loves anything GAA and his beloved Limerick team. Conor travels to all the Limerick matches – he was in Croke Park when Limerick won in 2018 and he hasn't missed a match since.

Conor is raising money for his families local National School in Kildimo where he and his siblings have all gone to school. Kildimo National School is an integral part of the local community.

MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS -EOIN, LIAM & DARA O'REILLY



Next we met with the O'Reilly family. The O'Reilly family have a strong interest in showing cattle with brothers Eoin, Liam and Darragh helping their father Jason on the family farm any minute they get.

The Bridgehouse herd consists of 18 breeding females, consisting of pedigree Hereford, Angus and Shorthorns. From a young age growing up, their father Jason always kept pedigree Herefords. The O'Reilly always liked Hereford cattle as they are very easy on the eye, docile and it is very easy to train a Hereford animal for the shows. "They make great suckler cows, and are easily managed". The O'Reilly brothers favourite cow on the farm is a cow which they purchased in Carrick-On-Shannon nearly five years ago. When selecting a cow for the

herd the brothers ideal cow type, is an old style traditional Hereford cow, with traditional markings, medium in size, and have a good bag of milk to rear a calf.

The O'Reilly's think this is a great project that has been set up by the Next Gen Herefords and Irish Hereford Prime. It's great that the money is going towards charity, but it's also a great incentive to get the young lads involved in the project.

The charity of choice for the brothers is North West STOP-Suicide Prevention. This is a very worthy charity which is voluntary based, provides counselling free of charge for all ages & works to prevent suicide by informing, educating and promoting positive mental health.

MEET THE YOUNG BREEDERS PAUL & KIAN BOHAN



Next we visited the farm of Paul and Kian Bohan from Cloone, Co. Leitrim. The Bohans were selected by the Connacht Hereford Branch to rear a Hereford cross calf for charity. Paul and Kian divide their time between the family farm, playing GAA for their local club and helping their father Padraig with Irish draught horses. The brothers, from a young age, have always had an interest in farming, especially cattle – "They have always been helping their parents on the farm since they were young". The Bohan duo are farming alongside their father Padraig where they have five Pedigree Hereford cows under the herd prefix 'Gortfadda'.

Love for Herefords

Father Padraig has been breeding and showing Irish draught horses for the last number of years and he always wanted to get a traditional breed of cattle to run alongside the horses – this led him to pedigree Herefords. He chose Herefords as Hereford genetics can maximise the value of a cow herd by leveraging; fertility, feed efficiency, profitability and docility. Father Padraig loves Irish draught horses but Kian and Paul's love lies with Pedigree Herefords.

The Bohan brothers are very well known within the Hereford show circles and are currently making big names for themselves in the Next Gen Herefords.

Within the show circles – Paul recently won the Junior Young Handler Championship at Longford Agricultural show last July past. 
Chosen Charity

16th European Hereford Conference

The 16th European Hereford Conference was held in France from 4th – 7th October.

The conference included a full four-day schedule including a visit to the Sommet d'Elevage – The world's number one livestock show. There were four delegates from Ireland in attendance at the conference; Joe O'Connor (IHBS Chairman), Willie Branagan (IHBS Council Member), Louise Callan (IHBS Secretary) & Larry Feeney (World Hereford Secretary) and there were 39 persons in attendance altogether from all across the world including, UK, USA, New Zealand, Estonia, Denmark, Sweden, Germany and Norway.

Welcome Reception:


The conference began with a free morning at the Sommet d'Elevage followed by the official opening of the Conference in the afternoon at the Conference Centre at the show. The group were given a tour of the cattle by Pascal Bastien (French Association President) which finished at the Hereford stand with a welcome drink & a selection of local cheeses and meats before a presentation of the Hereford cattle on display in the show ring. The group in full then attended a welcome cocktail & dinner that evening in Vichy.




































National Hereford Championship:

The big event for day two of the conference was the National Hereford Championship. There were three classes; Hereford bulls, Hereford heifers and Hereford cows with calves at foot. There was a Female Champion & a Male Champion crowned on the day. The Male Champion was UK bred; Romany 1 Popcorn, bred by Scotland's Romany Herefords, sired by Barwise 1 Lancer, a previous UK sire of the year, produced by Carolyn Fletcher

the President of the UK Hereford Society. The judge on the day was Mr. PJ Budler, originally from South Africa but currently living in USA, PJ is an international cattle judge and is CEO of Global Livestock Solutions. PJ commented on the Hereford breed stating it is "the breed that has changed the face of cattle breeding around the world which is a good thing for consumers".















Country Reports:

Each country relayed a report on the progress of Herefords at home during that afternoon. Although there are many differences between the countries the one issue facing every nation is climate change and the role agriculture needs to play in reducing carbon emissions. It is clear to see there is no one solution or "one size fits" all plan. Every country present delivered very interesting information about the workings within the world of farming and Herefords on their local patch including;


- Average bull prices in the UK this year was over 4000guineas & they are beginning to adopt a Linear scoring programme.
- In New Zealand, there are currently 21,000
 Pedigree Registered Herefords & they are
 making progress on their Genomic test
 programme.
- In Germany in 2021, the association celebrated their 30-year anniversary. They are currently working on a genomic evaluation programme.
- USA currently have 76,672 Pedigree Hereford Registrations. They are also hosting the next

- World Hereford Conference in October 2025 & are working on an excellent conference line up and some added tours also. They also have several research projects running at the minute in relation to genetics & efficiency.
- In Norway, 90% of the Herefords are Polled. The Norwegians choose Herefords because they are calm & robust. They have shown to have the fewest stillbirths & highest survival rates until weaning of all breeds in Norway. The Herefords low body weight also make them ideal for thriving in local landscapes. The Norweigans have also developed a Breeding programme where stock is evaluated for conformation, morphology of udders, hooves, legs, breeding values, temperament, health & fertility before being accepted onto a five month performance test programme where they are fed silage & meal & their feed intake & body weight are recorded daily. The best performing bulls are then chosen for AI & their progeny are also tested for performance.
- In Sweden, Herefords are the second largest

breed in the Swedish Beef Control Programme, after Charolais, with 3200 calves. All calves are weighed at birth, 200days & again at 365 days. Calving ease is also recorded. In 2021, heifers weighed at birth – 41kgs, at 200 days – 251kg and at 365 days – 386kgs. Bulls at birth weighed 43kgs, at 200days – 277kgs & at 365 days – 495kgs. All bulls must pass certain requirements before going for auction including high average daily weight gain, minimum Linear

- conformation & hoof health requirement.
- In Estonia, the most popular AI bull in 2021 & 2022 was Fisher 1 Rancher. They hope to import new genetics & increase the use of AI while increasing consumer awareness about the benefits of beef into the future.
- PJ Budler then closed the afternoon session by making a presentation entitled "Global Hereford Challenges & Opportunities".









International Gala Evening:

The delegates attended the International Gala evening, alongside 400 other international visitors, which illustrated a presentation of over 40 national

breeds of sheep, cattle and horses. The evening concluded with a cocktail in the showring and a performance by a traditional French band and some traditional Mongolian music also.



Hereford Farm tour:

The last day for the Irish delegation began with a tour of the farm EARL Vizelles. The farmer & host; Olivier Avignon and his wife & son welcomed the group and gave a tour of their cattle enterprise. Olivier farms 220 Hectares with just one employee. His main herd consists of 80 Charolais suckler cows but in 2016 he branched out and purchased Hereford cross suckler cows.

The farm is based in a predominantly breeding area of France given the poorer quality of the soil. This is Olivier's family farm which he inherited from his father. They also fatten pigs on site. In 2016, an opportunity arose for the farm to rent a further 80 Hectares which they went for. The farm was unsuitable for calving Charolais cattle so the farm invested in Hereford sucklers and have now grown to 40 Hereford suckler cows. Olivier is delighted with Herefords because of the good quality meat they produce and their good terminal traits. He started with crossbred Herefords including Herefords crossed with Limousin but the farm is slowly moving to fully purebred. They also imported Pedigree Herefords from Hungary.

All Herefords are finished for slaughter on the farm. All males are castrated between eight and 10 days old and fed as steers. Hereford heifers are currently earning the farm \$\subseteq\$6.00/kg dead with no heed given to weights or grades. In 2007, the farm employed a nutritionist to allow them to move towards producing 100% feed on the farm. As it turned out, the nutritionist now sells the Hereford beef from the farm to restaurants & hotels. Due to there being no traditional market for Herefords in France, because they're not the traditional breed, Hereford breeders need to build their own niche market to ensure good value for their product.

There is a stock bull running with the cows and the farm doesn't use any AI due to time management constraints. There is a mix of Spring and Autumn calving. Herefords are farmed outdoors all year round with hay supplemented in the Winter. Growth rates between Hereford & Charolais vary with the Charolais cows weighing 450kgs deadweight and Hereford cows weighing 350kgs deadweight but the inputs and costs are much lower with the Herefords.






























Charolais enterprise:

The farm finishes all Charolais females onsite but exports the Charolais steers to Italy for finishing at 420kgs. The farm also purchase cull cows from neighbouring farms to finish for slaughter. Olivier sells crossbred (HExCH) Heifers at 18 months for slaughter between 330 – 360kgs carcase weight

to Biggar Meat Business. The price at slaughter is currently; \(\tilde{5}\).40/kg deadweight for steers, \(\tilde{5}\).20/kg deadweight for cows & \(\tilde{3}\).30/kg liveweight for Charolais Steers exported to Italy. The cattle grade either U or R but recently there is little difference in the price between grades.









There is 100% of the feed produced on the farm and grass haylage is fed when alfalfa hay runs out, The dairy market is growing in France also and this is leaving little differences in prices between beef cattle & dairy beef cattle at slaughter. Holstein Friesian cows are currently making \$\Pi\$4.80/kgs which used to be \$\Pi\$1.80/kg compared to Charolais cattle selling for \$\Pi\$5.20/kg and used to be \$\Pi\$4.80/kg deadweight. This has taken value from the beef breeds.

Olivier Avignon & his family treated the tour to a fantastic spread for lunch before saying our goodbyes.









Guest Speakers:

That afternoon involved talks from three speakers including Mr. Jean Denaux who was instrumental in the start-up of Irish Hereford Prime 25 years ago. The French butcher was born into and reared in a farming family and his father was also a butcher. The farm was very much traditional and ran Charolais cattle in small buildings & outhouses. They found Charolais cows were hard to calve indoors and disease became an issue with the buildings being so small. Jean's father travelled in the 1970's and while in America he was first introduced to Hereford cattle. At the same time as the French Hereford Association was set up, Jean's father purchased a Hereford bull to run with Charolais heifers and was delighted with the progeny which turned out to be better balanced in terms of having the double muscling from Charolais and gaining a year on calving from Herefords. Jean commented that having the backing of the society meant a lot to the project. Jean didn't inherit the family farm but knew he wanted to work closely to a farming business. He went to Rungis, a large International market in Paris for trading food & horticultural products and he learned he was able to sell beef. From there, he met with chefs in French hotels and after chatting about cuts of beef and such he had a wakeup call and began his career as a wholesaler of beef. Over time, Jean was able to build up clientele with farmers and caterers. Jean's career began by importing Wagyu beef from Australia and maturing in France. From there then he began to mature Charolais beef but there was very little

demand in the catering sector at that time. Jean investigated importing Angus beef from Scotland but BSE was an issue at the time. He knew Ireland and New Zealand were producers of Hereford beef and contacted the Irish Hereford Breed Society to discuss whether a trade deal could be negotiated. After travelling to Ireland and inspecting carcases in a factory - trials were set up based on customer specifications and demands. Jean commented that if it's not raining in Ireland – it is thinking about raining which makes it an ideal location for producing grass fed beef which is what the caterers were demanding. The Irish was able to step upto the demands and meet consumer requirements. From this trade deal grew Irish Hereford Prime which has gone from strength to strength since & today processes over 65,000 cattle each year with 5,000 members. For this reason, it was delightful to hear from Mr. Jean Denaux on how his career began and the path that led him to Hereford beef. We also heard from Didier Deleau - specialist of



grass production who gave a detailed overview of grass production and grazing management in France which is proving to be instrumental in the fight against climate change as research has shown more grassland on French farms is helping reduce the carbon footprint. Didier concluded that Herefords are a breed with a future that meets; breeders' demands, consumer demands and society's expectations.

To cap off the presentations Ms. Sylvie Brunel – geographer, economist & writer made a presentation on the issues and barriers facing farmers globally in terms of climate change but concluded that breeding animals are beneficial

for the world population and vital for securing food for the growing population. The speaker also commented on how Herefords fit the Climate change solution perfectly given they are docile, fertile, rustic and have good maternal traits.

Final Farewell & Passing the Baton:

The final evening of the European Hereford Conference 2022 was a trip to Puy de Dome & although the cloud was down, the view & sunset was spectacular! The attending countries presented gifts to the French Association in appreciation & in-turn the French Association gifted each delegate a beautiful book & liqueur.

























Before the conference officially ended – Pascal Bastien (French Association President) handed over the European Conference Baton to Ireland who will host the next European Hereford Conference in 2026. This is a tradition that began in 1997 by the Estonians. Ireland will host the 17th European Hereford Conference in August 2026 following the last conference hosted in Ireland which was in 2005.



DUBLIN MARKETS

When Dublin dominated the cattle trade

Declan O'Brien writes about the Dublin Cattle Market, where livestock were sold to the city's abattoirs and butchers, and which supplied the live trade to Britain

ive cattle exports were crucially important to the Irish economy in the 1940s and 1950s. Indeed, the State's economic fortunes were closely tied to the revenues generated by the shipping of livestock on the hoof, which accounted for one-third of all export earnings.

Central to the operation of this liveshipping business was the Dublin Cattle Market.

This unique institution, located off Prussia St on the city's northside, was established by Dublin Corporation in 1863 to replace the old market in nearby Smithfield.

The Dublin Cattle Market regulated the supply of cattle, sheep and pigs to the city's abattoirs and butchers, and also helped service the growing live trade to Britain.

The facility had penning for 5,000 cattle and up to 10,000 sheep, with the enclosures serviced by walkways which allowed buyers to safely view the livestock.

Sales-masters

The selling was handled by sales-masters, who were essentially livestock auctioneers.

At its peak in the 1950s, the market claimed to be the largest city-based weekly livestock sale in Europe. Between 4,000 and 5,000 cattle and close to 7,000 sheep, were sold at the Prussia Street site each Wednesday – while pigs were also traded in its yards. The Dublin Cattle Market operated

The Dublin Cattle Market operated at the apex of a livestock purchasing network which involved dealers and buyers throughout the country.

It was essentially the shop window for Ireland's live cattle exports. Between 450,000 and 650,000 cattle were exported on the hoof' from Ireland each year during the 1940s, 1950s and early 1960s, with a significant proportion of the trade going through the Dublin market.

The Dublin market acted as the bellwether for Ireland's cattle export trade, with the prices paid in Prussia Street setting the tone for the trade nationally for the following week. Such was the importance of the market that reports were carried on RTÉ and national newspapers.

The market attracted buyers from Dublin's abattoirs and butchers, but the primary customers were British livestock traders acting for slaughter houses and farmers in the midlands and north of England and Scotland.


Ireland was an important supplier of both fat cattle and store cattle to English and Scottish farms. British historian John Martin estimated that around one-third of all cattle finished and slaughtered in Britain during the 1950s were bred on Irish farms. Many of these cattle were traded through Prussia Street.

Indeed, Dubliners' memories of the market invariably revolve around cattle being driven down the North Circular Road for export from the North Wall docks.

British buyers

The British store cattle buyers primarily took bullocks and light heifers. Some went directly to farms in the north of England or the midlands, while others were resold at centres such as Banbury, Rugby and York. There was also an important trade through the Dublin Cattle Market for fat bullocks and heifers. These were exported for immediate slaughter to abattoirs in Birkenhead, Liverpool and other centres.

There were a number of reasons why the British opted for Irish stock. Ireland effectively had a monopoly on the supply of live cattle to Britain since imports from the Continent were heavily restricted due to fears of foot-and-mouth disease. Crucially, cattle from Ireland qualified for British farm subsidies, which were known as deficiency payments. Another important factor was the long-established business links and connections between the British buyers and both the salesmasters in the Dublin market, and Irish exporters.



The Dublin Cattle Market attracted a mix of British, Continental and local buyers to the Prussia Street facility. For many British cattle buyers, the trip to Dublin was a weekly or fortightly occurrence. They generally arrived by boat on Tuesday evening and stayed overnight in local lodgings or in the City Arms Hotel which was close to the market.

After their business was concluded in the market on Wednesday morning, the cattle purchased were assigned to a shipping agent and the British buyers took the boat back that evening, However, as the 1960s progressed, some customers joined the 'jet set' and flew to Dublin.

The English and Scottish buyers were widely respected as excellent judges of cattle. Jimmy Cosgrave, whose family were farmers in Meath as well as sales masters in the Dublin Cattle Market, remembers the British as always looking for "a particular type of beast". They might only buy one animal that suited their specifications from a pen of 10 or more.

Continental buyers were also active in the market; although they never purchased the same numbers as the British. The European market generally took a different type of animal. They wanted leaner and cheaper animals, and took more cows than fat cattle.

Two of the more active men in the Continental trade, Heinrick Palm and Frans Buitelaar, established bases in Ireland. Palm was a German national who owned a 500-acre farm, Lunestown House, near Mullingar. He was a major shipper of cattle from Ireland to the continent from the 1950s to the early 1970s. Palm also shipped cattle from South America to Europe during this period, and was a significant buyer of Irish carcase beef for the German market.

Buitelaar was a Belgian who shipped stock to the Continent and later to Britain. The family are still involved in the cattle trade and in shipping stock, and have a base in Castledermot, Co Kildare.

Irish exporters also used the Dublin Market, usually as a reservoir or as an overflow for cattle. Similarly, the market was an important source of cattle and sheep for the city's butchers, and also for local meat factories such as International Meats in Grand Canal

Street and Irish Meat Packers in Leixlin. However, the Dublin Cattle Market's primary focus was its live export business. Indeed, its close association to the cattle export trade, and to the exporters, had been central to its success

in the century since its foundation.

Unfortunately, as Ireland shifted from shipping cattle on the hoof to exporting processed beef during the sec-ond half of the 1960s - and the Prussia Street facility came under increased pressure from the emerging marts network - the Dublin market's position as the country's premier livestock sales centre quickly faded. Effectively, its days were numbered.

The mechanics of the market

The Dublin Cattle Market was at the apex of a complex supply network that spanned much of the country.

Dealers and buyers acting for the market's sales-masters or other cattle traders bought cattle at fairs or off the land right across the south, midlands and west.

These cattle were then moved primarily by train east to Kildare. Meath and Dublin to be finished or sold immediately in Prussia Street.

Livestock going directly for sale in the market were generally rested and allowed to settle for a few days in small holdings called cattle parks which were dotted around the capital's western fringes.

These parks ranged in size but were generally 10-30ac blocks and were located in what are now established north Dublin suburbs such as Cabra, Finglas and Castleknock.

From the cattle parks, the livestock were shifted by local drovers into lairages or yards around Prussia Street, before being finally moved into the market on the morning of the sale.

The livestock were held in a series of pens, with the cattle tied and tethered to a rail at one end of the pen and their back ends facing out into alleyways that ran between the rows of pens.

Early start

Like meat markets around the world, the Dublin Cattle Market had an early start.

The gates opened for livestock at 3am on the Wednesday morning, the sale started at 5am and everything was done and dusted by noon at the latest.

The vast majority of the cattle sold went either one of two ways. Those bought by Dublin-based butchers or meat wholesalers went across the North Circular Road to the nearby Dublin City Abattoir, where they were slaughtered for local consumption.

Animals bought for export were driven across the north side of the city to the quays at North Wall to be shipped to Britain or the Continent.

The Dublin Cattle Market was located between Prussia Street and the North Circular Road, and was the country's premier livestock sale up to the 1960s.

Dublin's drovers - the market's urban cowboys

The sight of thousands of cattle being driven on foot through Dublin's city centre would be unthinkable today.

However, it was a common occurrence in the 1940s and 1950s when the Dublin Cattle Market was in its pomp.

The task of moving cattle and sheep from lairages into the market, and later to the abattoirs and the docks, was assigned to local drovers.

These drovers were generally Dubliners, primarily from the Phibsboro area, who were instantly recognisable by their long yellow cloth coats. The skill of these men in handling cattle was accepted by all who worked in the market.

Speed, skill and strength

Sam and Christy McKeever from Cabra worked as drovers on the stand of Joe Barry's family in the market. The Kilcock farmer said the speed, skill and strength with which they could handle and stall the cattle was incredible.

Interestingly, Christy McKeever had an eclectic mix of work. Along with droving

for the Barrys during the week, he also worked as a minder for the showband legend Dickie Rock at weekends.

Meath farmer and sales-master Jimmy Cosgrave recounted how drovers on bicycles could drive lines of cattle "half a mile" long down through the heart of Dublin to the boats at the North Wall with rarely a

Some of the drovers used dogs. These were usually collies crossed with terriers. or 'short hairs' as they were known. Occasionally, the dogs had bull rings in their nose to stop them nipping the sheep.

Many of the drovers started out in the job as children, helping to move cattle before or after school.

While some drovers, such as the McKeevers, were employed directly by particular sales-masters, many others worked on a casual basis.

Although droving was a difficult job, it offered a way into the cattle business for some locals. Paddy Gernon from Grangegorman started off driving cattle around the market as a young lad. He later worked in Belfast, before joining Smith Griffin in the Dublin Cattle Market. Eventually, Gernon became a major cattle shipper in his own right.

Emergence of marts ended Prussia Street's glory days

The Dublin Cattle Market was overtaken by the profound changes in the 1960s livestock trade, writes Declan O'Brien in the second of this two-part series

he Dublin Cattle Market was the premier sale centre for Irish livestock from the 1860s to the 1950s. However, it was closed up and gone by the

Although close to 5,000 cattle a week were sold through the Prussia Street facility on the capital's northside in the years after the Second World War – when the market effectively set the price paid for livestock at fairs around the country – its fortunes nosedived in the transformative period leading up to Ireland joining the EEC in the mid-1970s.

EEC in the mid-1970s.

Indeed, as early as May 1964, the Irish Farmers Journal was warning that the market was in commercial danger and risked becoming an irrelevance in the livestock trade.

There are a number of reasons for its rapid decline and ultimate demise.

The beginning of the end

The establishment and expansion of both co-operative and private marts

during the late 1950s and 1960s negatively impacted the number of animals sold through the Dublin Cattle Market, while the expansion of Ireland's carcase beef industry in the 1960s resulted in fewer fat cattle being exported through Prussia Street for slaughter in Britain.

Moreover, efforts to retain the Dublin market were undermined by rising losses at the sale centre, and the absence of a strategic vision for the facility on the part of the Dublin Corporation.


However, the emergence of the cooperative mart movement – which was in essence a challenge to the existing power structure within the Irish cattle industry – was the most serious and pressing threat to the Dublin Cattle Market in the early 1960s.

Co-op movement

Since the second half of the 19th century, wealthy livestock graziers and shippers - the main patrons of the Dublin market - had controlled the Irish cattle industry.

This dominance was reflected in the fairs around the country, where dealers and traders, often acting for exporters or graziers, effectively controlled the sale and purchase price of livestrek.

By the mid 1950s, however, farmers were determined to challenge the exporters' dominance of the livestock The official opening of Nenagh Mart, Co Tipperary in 1957. By 1970 there were 61 co-operative mart societies. The expansion of the mart network eroded the Dublin Cattle Market's dominance of the livestock sector.



This process was driven by farm organisations such as the National Farmers' Association, the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers Association (ICMSA) and the co-operative umbrella group, ICOS.

The marts were a more satisfactory means of selling livestock from the farmers' perspective, because they offered greater transparency in bidding, open competition for stock and a guarantee of payment.

antee of payment.
The popularity of the co-operative mart model among farmers was illustrated by their exponential growth.
Although there were just three

Although there were just three farmer-owned co-operative mart societies operating in the country in 1956—these were in Waterford, Kilkenny and Bunclody, Co Wexford—by 1970 this figure had increased to 61. Some of these, including Cork Marts and Golden Vale Marts, had multiple sales centres.

The sustained growth of the mart movement was reflected in the sales figures received for the farmer-owned co-ops.

Livestock sales in these co-operative marts totalled over £7,6m in 1961. By 1969, they exceeded £46m.

The rise of the marts meant the end of the road for the fairs and this had profound implications for livestock dealers, traders and exporters. It was also a major blow to the Dublin Cattle

Impact

The impact of the marts' expansion on the fortunes of the Dublin market was two-fold – firstly, the new sales centres took cattle that would traditionally have been sold in the Prussia Street market, and secondly, the marts undermined the market's status and standing as the premier livestock sale in the country.

British buyers soon found that they could just as easily purchase and ship from the Dublin market.

Decline

As the number of cattle sold through the local mart network rose steadily, there was a corresponding decline in the Prussia Street trade.

By the late 1960s, cattle numbers offered each week in the Dublin market had fallen from the 5,000 head of the 1950s, to just 800 or so animals, and had dropped to 300-400 by the early 1970s.

Essentially, the Dublin market was now no more significant than regional marts such as Kilmallock, Kilkenny or Mitchelstown.

The absence of an agreed strategic vision for the cattle market on the part of the Dublin Corporation and the sales-masters also contributed to its eventual closure.

eventual closure.

If the market was to survive the radical changes taking hold in the Irish livestock trading environment in the early 1960s, then it would have to compete with the emerging mart movement. Unfortunately, Dublin Corporation's commitment to, and enthusiasm for, the Dublin Cattle Market was steadily waning.

End of an era

Minutes from corporation meetings in the 1960s are replete with complaints about traffic congestion in the vicinity of the market because of all the cattle trucks.

There were similar complaints regarding the moving of cattle through the streets of the city, and the consequent mess from cow dung.

Falling revenues accentuated the corporation's dissatisfaction with the market

Lower numbers at the Dublin Cattle Market's sales meant reduced levies on livestock sales. The market's losses – which were

The market's losses – which were borne by the Dublin Corporation – increased significantly during the 1960s. Losses totalled more than £11,000 in



Up to 5,000 cattle and 7,000 sheep were sold in the Dublin Cattle Market each



and exceeded £39,000 by 1972. The lack of a long-term plan for the cattle market on the part of the Dublin

Corporation certainly contributed to its inexorable decline from the mid-1960s.

Attempts were made to restructure and even relocate the market's operations, but these efforts were undermined by legal challenges or by the lobbying power of various vested interests – or a combination of both.

Eventually, following a review of the market's organisation and control in 1967-1968, the Dublin Corporation indicated that no further capital expenditure could be justified on the Prussia Street facility.

The writing was now on the wall for the Dublin Cattle Market – it was earmarked for closure. The sales-masters bitterly resented

The sales-masters bitterly resented the Corporation's failure to invest in the market and legally opposed moves by the local authority to close the facility.

Ironically, however, they also consistently opposed any increase in the levies by the Corporation during the 1960s.

The sales-masters' efforts to keep the Dublin Cattle Market open went all the way to the Supreme Court – but eventually failed.

The last 325 cattle were traded at Prussia Street on May 9, 1973.

Reflecting on the market's closure, Joe Barry – whose family were salesmasters – said the Prussia Street facility was "invaluable for its time" but it was an "archaic way of doing business."

"The whole way [the market] operated was for another era," Barry maintained.

That era finally ended in 1973.

Dublin market hit by surge in beef exports

The unprecedented expansion in the Irish meat processing industry in the mid-1960s was a serious blow to the Dublin Cattle Market.

Under the Anglo-Irish Free Trade Agreement of 1965, Ireland committed to exporting at least 638,000 store cattle to Britain every year, with British subsidies, or deficiency payments, being paid on the animals.

Significantly, however, support payments were also extended to include 25,000t of Irish prime carcase beef exports to Britain.

This was a major concession on the part of the British government, as it was the first time that UK exchequer supports were paid on Irish processed beef.

Charles Haughey, the then Minister for Agriculture, took advantage of the British concession by offering subsidies on all Irish prime beef exports to the UK, in addition to the 25,000t which qualified for the deficiency payments.

Irish beef exports trebled in just three years as a consequence of the increased supports.

Exports

While overall beef exports totalled 55,000t in 1965, this figure rose to almost 150,000t by 1967.

Moreover, beef exports to Britain experienced the most profound growth yet, increasing from 28,000t to 100,000t between 1965 and 1970. Irish and UK support payments to the beef processors totalled £10m between 1966 and 1970.

This prompted the Store Cattle Study Group report to observe that the growth in beef exports during this period was thanks to an "open-ended support system" from the Irish Government.

The increased supports for the beef processors had a negative impact on the Dublin Cattle Market, however. Exporters and English buyers could not compete for fat cattle against the factory agents.

Stiffer competition resulted in higher prices and this made Irish cattle less attractive for the English buyers. As a consequence, the numbers coming to Dublin declined steadily.

The numbers of fat cattle exported also collapsed in the wake of the Anglo-Irish Free Trade Agreement.

Fat cattle exports totalled nearly 200,000 head in 1966, but fell to just 16,000 two years later.

Animals that would formerly have been shipped and slaughtered in Birkenhead or Liverpool were now being processed at home in Ireland.

The loss of the fat cattle trade was a devastating blow for the Dublin Cattle Market. It had been one of the pillars of the sale.

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
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DENIS LEHANE: THE ARRIVAL OF THE HEREFORD

or the first time since the mart's foundation, Denis Lehane bid for a Hereford bullock. There was silence in the ring. Shock and surprise all around. I recently purchased a Hereford bullock. It's very exciting news. He's the first Hereford I've purchased in over 50 years.

Usually a supporter of the bargain bullock - the fellow who might saunter into the ring with three legs or two tails - it was a delight to finally secure a regular bullock. And not any old regular bullock - but a Hereford! The Hereford is a classy animal.

However, when I first watched this particular Hereford walk into the ring, what I saw was a hungry little guy, a fellow clearly on meagre rations. But seeing as how he was a Hereford (and therefore classy) I felt he was a little bit above my league. He would be purchased by the big guys, with their big wallets.

Hands would soon fly as a bidding war got underway, I figured. The bidding began with this old guy shouting out a small number in the direction of the auctioneer. Clearly, the Hereford's meagre frame did not excite the gathered throng assembled at the mart.

And better again, the old boy's opening bid wasn't immediately trumped by another interested party. So for the first time in living memory, for the first time since the mart's foundation, the hand of Mr Lehane was raised to show an interest in bidding for a Hereford.

There was silence in the ring. Shock and surprise all around. None more surprised than the auctioneer. Rubbing his eyes in disbelief, he accepted my bid, but only on an assurance that I wasn't drunk. I was

breaking new ground.

'Twas really only when I raised my hand to counter the old boy's second bid that I was taken seriously. The race was on. For the next three-and-a-half minutes a gigantic bidding battle ensued, as this old guy of about 97 fought with me for the Hereford. He fought well, but I fought better.

Time after time he raised the stakes by \Box 5 and \Box 10, only for me to trump them all. Eventually, I

succeeded in outbidding Methuselah. With a shake of his head, he indicated to the world his decision to step aside. The bullock was mine.

He cost me a few quid more than I normally pay, but he was worth it. And what the hell, you only live once. I've always been a great admirer of the Hereford, but never in my wildest dreams did I see a time when one would come my way.

So it was a dream come true to head into the yard with my new purchase. "Go on now," says I, as I ushered the Hereford out of the trailer. "Go meet up with your new friends."

And with that, as if by magic, my herd of misfits, rogues and scallywags galloped into the yard full of bustle and curiosity.

It was like a scene from Oliver Twist. 'Twas practically Dickensian. A new addition to the gang had arrived, and me like Fagin attempting to be the benevolent host.

"Come on there now lads, give him a bit of room," I demanded as they crowded around us. All were excited to see the new face.

The arrival of the Hereford heralds an exciting new chapter for this farm. It's a step up. It marks the beginning of a new era for me. A new adventure. I'm in a different league now, I'm finally up there with the big boys.



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













ARGENTINE HEREFORD HERD OCULAR PIGMENTATION


quamous cell carcinoma (CCEO) in the bovine eye is a pathology that affects elderly animals, older than five years, as well as different breeds. It appearance is related to the absence of pigmentation around the eye and direct exposure to ultraviolet radiation. Some authors also point out genetic factors as well as associations with papilloma virus.

It is the most frequent neoplasm in cattle, being a cause of discarding, economic losses and implications for animal welfare, since self-trauma is an effect of discomfort in response to pain.

As a result of this, the Technical Staff of the Argentine Hereford Breeders Association carries out continuous studies to monitor de state of their rodeos.







In the year 2022, the ocular pigmentation of more than 11 thousand animals of both sexes belonging to 230 Hereford breeders in 14 provinces of the country were evaluated.


Technically, it was decided to use the Uruguayan Pigmentation Table, in order to unify the method of mesurement.


The study yields encouraging data for the breed. 62% of the bulls under the selected programs of the Argentine Association have a 100%

pigmentation, which added to those with 75 and 50% give a total of 89% of animals with significant protection to avoid CCEO.

In the case of females, 70% have both eyes with full pigmentation. 13% have 50% pigmentation.

The Argentine Hereford Breeders Association continues to evaluate its rodeos with the intention of improving the breed and making it the best option in the meat market.





MAWARRA GENETICS SWEEPS THROUGH THE CLASSES AS ULTRA STAR TAKES GRAND CHAMPION

It was a family affair as bulls from Mawarra Genetics swept through the classes at the 2022 Herefords Australia National Show to take intermediate, reserve senior and grand champion. Mawarra stud principals Peter and Deanne Sykes, Longford, Victoria, were also emotional seeing a bull exhibited by their son Brandon and daughter-in-law Brittany Sykes win junior champion.

Mawarra Ultra Star R182, a son of US sire Endure 173D, was sashed as intermediate and grand champion by judge Steve Reid, Millmerran, Queensland, in front of an appreciative audience. The 24-month-old weighed 1004kg and had a raw eye muscle scan of 140sqcm, 14mm at the P8, 9mm at the rib and a scrotal circumference of 40cm.

On BREEDPLAN, Ultra Star had a 600-day weight of +123kg, eye muscle area of +8.6sqcm and an intramuscular fat percentage of +2.3.

Mawarra also exhibited the reserve senior champion, Mawarra Jupiter R044, a son of Yarram Unique F181, and recipient of a new shield in memory of late Hereford breeder, Clinton Baulch. The shield was presented by Herefords Australia deputy chairman Marc Greening, with Clinton's wife Jacquie and children Thomas and Indi, present.

The Herefords Australia National Show was held at the Wodonga Stud Stock Exhibition Centre on May 11, drawing 106 junior, intermediate, and senior bulls from 34 vendors from four states. Judge Steve Reid described Ultra Star as being extreme in muscle with moderate birthweight, positive calving ease and marbling. "He gives the industry a lot we can take forward in our cattle in one jump," he said.

"The bull has a wonderful balance of phenotype

and data, with tremendous EMA (eye muscle area) and IMF (intramuscular fat), 400- and 600-day weight, moderate birthweight, and positive calving ease.

"Phenotypically he has tremendous length of body and butt shape."

Vendor Peter Sykes said the bull was the type the family had been aiming to breed and one the industry was looking for.

"He has moderate birth, good growth and tremendous carcase attributes and IMF, and it was pleasing to see that come through on the raw data," Mr Sykes.

"Overall, it has been a great line up of bulls here with people concentrating on carcase and structure. "We are really proud to see the next generation out there and that's what it is all about – we love them being involved and they've done great with their own cattle."

The highly competitive junior classes produced Mawarra B Show Stopper S001 as champion. Exhibited by Brandon and Brittany Sykes, Koetong, Victoria, the 13-month-old bull was sired by Mawarra Showtime P277, weighed 562kg, had a 90sqcm eye muscle area, scanned with 16mm on the rump, 9mm on the rib and had a scrotal circumference of 34cm.

On BREEDPLAN, the young bull had a whopping +8.8sqcm for eye muscle area, and +64kg for carcase weight.

Judge Steve Reid said he was a best combination of muscle and structure.

"There is real class about this young bull and I look forward to seeing what he can contribute to the industry," he said.

"With an EMA of +8.8, it is terrific to see those sort of bulls coming through at Wodonga," he said.

Scott Lewington, Kymarney Herefords, Uranquinty, exhibited the reserve junior champion, Kymarney Nixon R045, a 19-month-old son of Wirruna Nixon N168 and weighing in at 816kg. Nixon had BREEDPLAN figures of +4.1sqcm for EMA, +1.2 per cent for IMF, and a birthweight of +4.8kg.

Andrew Green, Yarrandabbie Herefords, Barfold, Victoria, was on the halter of his bull, Yarrandabbie Richard R004, when it was sashed reserve intermediate champion.

The 23-month-old bull weighed 896kg, had a raw eye muscle area of 133sqcm, and scanned 18mm on the rump and 12mm on the rib.

Sired by Glendan Park Panama P004, Richard had estimated breeding values of +22 for milk, +5.9sqcm for eye muscle area and +65kg for carcase weight.

Tim Hayes, Tarcombe Herefords, Ruffy, Vic, paraded his bull Tarcombe Cadbury R056 to win

the senior champion sash.

Sired by Banemore Cadbury M003, the 25-monthold weighed 914kg, had a raw eye muscle area of 133sqcm, and scanned at 17mm at the rump and 9mm on the rib.

Cadbury had a birthweight EBV of +2.9kg, a 600-day weight of +85kg and an eye muscle area of +6.7sqcm.

Mr Reid described the bull as structurally correct with a heap of muscle and athletic movement. The most successful exhibitor of the National Show was Mawarra Genetics

HEREFORD NATIONAL SALE, WODONGA, A CRACKER WITH \$130,000 TOP PRICE

The Hereford breed stamped its dominance in the market posting a thumping top price of \$130,000 and a new record average of \$15,794 at the 57th Herefords Australia National Show and Sale.

Held on May 12 at Wodonga, the National Sale drew buyers from NSW, Victoria, Tasmania, and Queensland, and was interfaced with AuctionsPlus. Billed as one of the largest multi-vendor sales in southern Australia, it catered for 34 vendors from four states.

Overall, 102 bulls sold from the 106 offered for a 96 per cent clearance, gross of \$1,611,000 and average of \$15,794.

In the sale breakdown, a total of 59 junior bulls sold to a top of \$35,000 and average of \$12,847 while 43 senior bulls sold to a top of \$130,000 and average of \$19,837.

Creating plenty of excitement in the sale barn was Mawarra Ultra Star R182 selling for a new record top price of \$130,000 to Tom Nixon, Devon Court Herefords, Drillham, Queensland.

The price eclipsed the previous top of \$103,000 set in 2021 by Mawarra If Only Q264.

The 24-month-old Mawarra Ultra Star R182 by US sire Endure 173D was sold by Peter and Deanne Sykes, Mawarra Genetics, Longford, Victoria, and had been sashed as the intermediate champion bull and then eventually grand champion by judge Steve Reid the day before.

Weighing 1004kg, Ultra Star had BREEDPLAN figures of +123kg for 600-day weight, +27kg for milk, +82kg for carcase weight, and +8.6sqcm for eye muscle area.

Mr Nixon confirmed the New Zealand semen rights were sold to the Robbie family, Otapawa Herefords, NZ.

He had a strategic plan to buy two full brothers and had earlier paid \$35,000 for the top price bull at Mawarra's on-property sale, Mawarra Ultimate R140, partnering with Cascade Poll Herefords, Currabubula, NSW.

"We will have a multi-sire joining to the stud cows this year to those two bulls, on top of an AI program using our new Canadian sire KJ Medium, which just sold for CAN\$240,000 – we partnered with Otapawa for Australian semen rights," Mr Nixon said.

"It was phenotype and pedigree first (with Ultra Star) – breed leading data sets with top one per cent most of the way through with moderate birthweight, calving ease, EMA (eye muscle area), fat and IMF (intramuscular fat)."

Vendors Peter and Deanne Sykes were overwhelmed and humbled by the result.

"The outlook for the breed is great with people willing to spend money on good genetics with the right traits," Mr Sykes said.

"Our grass-fed markets are going well for Herefords and the cattle sold today certainly had those carcase traits and doing ability Herefords are known for."

It was a day full of emotion for vendor Andrew Green, Yarrandabbie Herefords, Barfold, Vic, when his bull Yarrandabbie Richard R004, named in honour of his late father, Dick Green, sold for the second top price of \$70,000 to Marc Greening, Injemira Genetics, Book Book, NSW.

The 23-month-old bull had been sashed as reserve intermediate champion and was sired by Glendan Park Panama P004.

On BREEDPLAN, the young sire had a birthweight of +5kg, milk of +22kg, carcase weight of +65kg and eye muscle area of +5.9sqcm.

Mark and Wendy Campion, Amos Vale Herefords, Pinkett, NSW, outlaid the third top price of \$60,000 for Mawarra Justify R265, a 23-month-old

son of Mawarra Evolution weighing 890kg from the Sykes family stable.

Mr Campion said the bull ticked all the boxes a Hereford sire required.

"Overall, he was a beautifully balanced bull with good structure, a tonne of depth, good length and massive figures," Mr Campion said.

"We have used Mawarra before and moving forward our mission would be to use him over Yarram Park and Newcomen females.

"As far as weaner prices go, everything is just brilliant with all our clients benefitting from that and the back-to-back seasons.

"It is really good for the rural sector after such a hammering during the drought years, and it looks like we might have three good seasons in a row. "That puts confidence back into everything and that leads into this industry, and it is showing here today.

"This sale is totally underpinned by commercial and stud buyers."

Andrew Hore, Rotherfield Poll Herefords, Mullengandra, paid \$50,000 for Glendan Park Regal R016 offered by Alvio Trovatello, Glendan Park Herefords, Kyneton, Vic.

The 25-month-old bull was by Glendan Park Panama P004, weighed 904kg, had a raw eye muscle scan of 128sqcm, a birthweight estimated breeding value of +4.5, carcase weight of +70kg and eye muscle area of +6.1sqcm.

Phil "Bluey" Commins, Nunniong Herefords, Ensay, outlaid \$38,000 for Hollow Point R024, a son of Yavenvale M446 and with an EBV of +108kg for 600-day weight, +24kg for milk and +66 for carcase weight. The bull was sold by Alex Townsend, Hollow Point Herefords, Tinderbox, Tasmania.

The commercial producers entered the bidding at \$35,000 with Hunt Agriculture, Moree, NSW, taking home Mawarra Union Pacific R424, a Koanui Techno 3062 son from the Sykes family.

Pat, James and Nikki Pearce, Yavenvale Herefords and Poll Herefords, Adelong, NSW, purchased Morganvale Rookie R306 for \$34,000 from Allan Morgan, Morganvale Herefords, Keith, SA.

Among the volume commercial buyers on the day was Scott Reardon, Rockford Pty Ltd, Bothwell, Tasmania, with Mawarra Jackaroo R262 for

\$22,000, Hollow Point Redneck R017 for \$20,000 and Mawarra Jupiter R044 for \$24,000.

Mr Reardon was investing in genetics after selling 170 steers (top pen was 457kg) and 49 heifer weaners at Powranna for an overall average of \$2175.

"I like good meaty cattle without being extreme. I like the Hereford's temperament, growth, carcase, calving ease and doing ability," he said.

Herefords Australia National Show and Sale (Wodonga) committee chairman Alvio Trovatello described the event as a "great outcome and clearance".

"Elite stud sires were making record prices and very good top end commercial sires sold well," Mr Trovatello said.

"It was good to see the strong commercial support with repeat buyers and quite a few people bidding online.

"The social aspect is a big part of it – it's a big few

days on the Hereford calendar.

"Since COVID has come and gone people have really been looking forward to the event this year with a different level of optimism off the back of strong cattle prices and the season."

Stud stock agent Peter Godbolt, Nutrien Ag Solutions, Albury, said commercial producers paid \$25,000 to \$30,000 for bulls while studs operated at the top end.

"Off the back of the weaner sales through January and in the mountains in March, buyers were getting good money for their calves and were willing to invest in the genetics – it was a credit to the breeders what they are doing for their commercial clients," Mr Godbolt said.

"With a new record top price for Wodonga – it was good to see the breeders getting rewarded for what they do, and the Hereford breed getting recognised within the industry."

Mr Godbolt said online buyers bid on around half the catalogue.

DUBBO, AUSTRALIA

HEREFORDS SET DUBBO ALIGHT WITH NATIONAL TOP OF \$120,000

Prices leapt into the stratosphere at the 2022
Herefords Australia National Sale at Dubbo on
June 7, punching out a new record top of \$120,000.
A total of 12 existing and three new vendors from
NSW and Queensland offered 50 polled bulls and
14 females at the event which was interfaced with
AuctionsPlus and drew 79 registered bidders.

Of the 64 head offered, 54 were sold for an 84 per cent clearance, gross of \$709,000 and overall average of \$13,129 – eclipsing the previous record of \$11,042 set in 2021.

In the sale breakdown, of the 50 bulls offered, 42 were sold to a top of \$120,000, gross of \$618,000 and average of \$14,714.

In the females, 12 sold from the 14 offered to a top of \$14,000, gross of \$91,000 and average of \$7583.

Vendors Greg and Del Rees, The Ranch, Tomingley, were over the moon with excitement to create a new top price of \$120,000 for their grand champion bull, The Ranch Remington R028. The August 2020 drop son of New Zealand sire Koanui Techno 3062 was bought in partnership by David and Olwyn Lyons, Melville Hereford and Poll Herefords, Vasey, Vic, and Stephen Peake, Bowen Poll Herefords, Barraba, NSW.

On BREEDPLAN, the bull had a 600-day weight of +100kg, milk of +27kg, carcase weight +68kg and eye muscle area of +3.7sqcm.

Stephen Peake was impressed with the bull's structural soundness, carcase, mobility and outcross bloodlines.

David Lyons liked the bull's softness, thickness, carcase, conformation and BREEDPLAN figures. Mr Lyons confirmed there had already been plenty of semen interest in the bull.

The second top price of \$42,000 was paid by Cascade Poll Herefords, Currabubula, NSW, for Ironbark Glen Romeo, a son of Kanimbla Prospector M086, offered by Vic and Carolyn Camilleri, Ironbark Glen Poll Herefords, Oberon, NSW.

The October 2020 drop bull had a low birthweight combined with milk of +17kg, and +3.9sqcm eye muscle area.

Kelly and Teeney Runzer, Tenaru Poll Herefords, Goondiwindi, bid to \$40,000 for Armada Roff, the junior champion bull offered by Andrew and Brooke Rayner, Armada Poll Herefords, Hargraves, NSW.

The Grathlyn Holyfield N019 son had BREEDPLAN figures of +117kg for 600-day weight, +79kg for carcase weight, and +5.4sqcm for eye muscle area.

Lambert Pastoral, Charleville, Qld, outlaid \$30,000 for Ironbark Glen Revolver, a son of Eathorpe North N018 while Chris Lisle, Tummel Herefords, Walcha, paid \$28,000 for Valley View Rubble R003



Buyer Stephen Peake, Bowen Poll Herefords, vendor Greg Rees, Nutrien Livestock team Joel Fleming, John Settree, and Howard Carter, buyers Olwyn and David Lyons, Melville Park Poll Herefords, Vasey, vendor Del Rees and handler Emma Rees, and the \$120,000 The Ranch Remington R028

sold by Paul and Angela Durkin, Valley View stud, Warialda.

Mark McInerney, Garryowen Poll Herefords, Riverton, SA, bought Grathlyn Rochester R027 for \$26,000 and Ben and Leanne Rumbel, Supple Whiteface, Guyra, sold Supple Schmick for \$20,000 to a Bordertown, SA, buyer through AuctionsPlus.

D & K Page paid \$20,000 for Valley View Ramjet R042, Grathlyn Ronaldinho sold for \$20,000 on AuctionsPlus and Nutrien Ag Solutions purchased Armada Ripper for \$18,000 on behalf of a Cooma client.

Other buyers on the day included Round Mount Poll Herefords, Mudgee, buying Llandillo Russia R121 for \$14,000 and the NSW Department of Primary Industries paid \$12,000 for Callaway 173D Streaker S009.

In the female lots, Andrew and Jessica Quirk, Pinnacle Poll Herefords, Forbes, outlaid the top price of \$14,000 for Llandillo Aster S56, an April 2021 drop daughter of Grathlyn Pacemaker. Pinnacle also invested \$13,500 in Llandillo Julie S24, \$10,000 for Llandillo WFC Nora and \$7000 for Llandillo Gladiola S18.

Mr Quirk had been in inactive Hereford breeder for 24 years and has returned to the fold to form a stud herd.

"I thought the four heifers were a great line, very even, true to type and they will be the platform for the stud herd," Mr Quirk said.

Damian Halloway, Tobruk Herefords, Wagga Wagga, bought the joined heifer JTR Harriette R032 for \$10,000 and Garryowen Poll Herefords paid \$7000 for the grand champion female, JTR Irish Rose P021 and her heifer calf.

"New vendors Valley View Poll Herefords averaged \$24,000 for their bulls, and all three of the new vendors indicated they will be back."

Herefords Australia National Sale Dubbo committee chairman Andrew Rayner was pleased with the sale result.

"Considering three years ago there was a lot of people saying the sale wouldn't continue, we have definitely figured out we have a place in the industry," Mr Rayner said.

CANADIAN HEREFORD ASSOCIATION REPORT



The Canadian Hereford Association recently released its new strategic marketing plan titled 'Better Your Beef'. Since its creation, the Association has been using the plan to guide marketing and identify priorities for breeders. The plan identified six priority areas for the Association and breeders to focus their efforts:

- 1. Empower breeders to commit to a coherent and consistent strategy.
- 2. Be a maternal ingredient for a productive crossbreeding program.
- 3. Affirm Hereford as the most cost-efficient breed.
- 4. Improve Hereford's influence producing a quality carcass.

- 5. Dispel the image of Hereford as yesterday's breed.
- 6. Connect as a breed of choice for upcoming generations of cattle producers.

The Hereford breed is known in Canada for its maternal attributes and ability to thrive under adverse conditions. Moving forward, the Better Your Beef strategic marketing plan will serve to position the Canadian Hereford Association as a leader in the beef industry and increase recognition of Hereford and Hereford Influence cattle as a vital part of the production chain.

In August 2022, the Canadian Hereford
Association recruitment committee selected
Michael Latimer as the new Executive Director.
Michael will work closely with the CHA Board of
Directors in implementing the Better Your Beef
marketing plan and operating the Association.
Michael has experience in the seedstock sector
through his involvement in Remitall Cattle
Company, the Canadian Beef Breeds Council and
other leading beef breed associations in Canada.
Through these organizations, Michael has acquired
experience in operational management, primary
production, government relations and board
governance.

Agricultural events in Canada returned to a sense of normalcy in 2022 with venues welcome prepandemic crowds back to in-person events. In November, the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair celebrated its 100th anniversary and hosted the National Hereford Show. Canadian Western Agribition hosted 128 international guests



representing 13 countries, marking a substantial increase from 2021 and a return to numbers from the last pre-pandemic show in 2019.

The Canadian Junior Hereford Association hosted its annual junior show, Bonanza, in Lindsay, Ontario during July 2022. Like other events, the show welcomed back pre-pandemic numbers, with 135 junior members and about 200 cattle entered. Bonanza 2023 will be hosted in Brudenell, Prince Edward Island from July 25-29 at the Rodd Brudenell River Resort. With the exciting resort venue, the Canadian Hereford Association will also welcome adult members to participate in conference activities beyond the usual annual general meeting and board meetings.

After extreme drought conditions across much of western Canada in 2021 that saw dramatic reductions in Canadian cowherds, a strong cattle market was a welcome surprise. Purebred cattle sales remained strong for all breeds of cattle throughout 2022. Commercial feeder and fat cattle welcomed a strong market that trended higher than in 2021 for most of the year. Among other factors,



the strong market is due to increased consumer demand across Canada and internationally for Canadian beef and genetics. Inflationary pressures from the global economy, weather related events and geopolitical conflicts have created added pressure on the beef supply chain which have led to increased input costs for producers and agri-food companies.

The year 2022 has been a busy year for us.

These champions also attended the champion of the world and miss world online competitions as the Finnish representatives but without success this year.

During fall 2022 our association representatives took part in the Nordic Cattle Genetic Evaluation workshop where we discussed breeding goals for Herefords in Nordic countries. The workshop was held in Copenhagen on September 22nd.

The year 2023 will be a huge step in Finnish beef cattle breeding as we are getting the first

genomic breeding values for beef cattle in March 2023. Over 4000 hereford animals have been genotyped this far in this Genomic project where these genomic breeding values are developed, and breeders are very excited to see the results of their hard work. So far, the breeders have gotten genomic information about the animal's genetic defects and polled genes from genotyping. Last winter hypotrichosis was added to the genomic chip so all the genotyped Herefords automatically get the hypotrichosis information. Breeders are also getting results for MD from now on by genotyping their animals. Our target in Finland is to get as much information as possible by sending only one tissue sample for genotyping and to increase number of pedigree verified animals.

NZ HEREFORDS REPORT FOR THE IRISH HEREFORD BREED SOCIETY

Like every society, 2022 continued to be a challenging year for NZ Herefords. Planned events were once again postponed with the Coast-to-Coast Herd tour postponed until March 2023. The herd tour organizing committee did not expect to be involved for three years and have their fingers crossed that 2023 will be 'third time lucky'! The Youth development weekend was also postponed however we did hold a very successful Leadership Day where we invited a dozen of 18 -30-year-old members to attend a communication session. By sitting a psychometric test, they had a great insight to their personal strengths and from that they learnt the importance of tailoring their communication skills. We plan to continue to work with this membership cohort in the coming years,

as the board has identified its responsibility to educate our future leaders. By the end of 2022 the covid situation had settled down more, so we hosted the inaugural "Milk the Meat" field day, targeted at dairy farmers to encourage them to use high genetic worth beef bulls.

Although the National Sale, and breed dinner were sadly cancelled, the autumn private bull sales being one month later, did go ahead. There was a tie at the top of the leader board for the highest priced Hereford bull sold between Matariki Herefords, (located at Kaikoura) and Okawa Herefords, (also in the South Island at Mt Somers), both selling sires for \$47,000. The yearling Spring top price went to Mahuta Herefords, South Auckland at \$14,000

for Mahuta Routeburn 1059 sold to Craigmore Herefords, Hamilton. Routeburn 1059 is a son of Mahuta Ocean 8073, a bull that has performed exceptionally well in the recent Beef and Lamb Genetics Dairy Beef Progeny test and has a wellbalanced EBV profile with low birthweight and high growth. A great line of yearling bulls that were attractive to both dairy and beef farmers meant a full clearance was achieved on 58 bulls sold and at an average of \$4540, which is the highest ever achieved for a Hereford Yearling bull sale. It has continued to be a challenging year for beef breeders with the NZ government further implementing environmental targets to be met. However, as Herefords have proven that they are structurally suited to rugged country and with the ability to mature between 400 days and 600 days, there is confidence in the members, (encouraged by the use of SNP DNA results enabling better selection decisions at an earlier stage of their breeding programme) they can efficiently meet the future market demands,

One of this year's highlights for myself and Gray Pannett (President of NZ Herefords) was to attend the European tour in France and then to be invited to the UK Hereford Cattle Society Autumn Show and sale in Shrewsbury. Gray and I also had a beneficial meeting with Ivor Deverell

from Irish Hereford Prime however I particularly found catching up and exchanging ideas with the other general managers in France professionally valuable. It's always interesting to hear how despite the similarities of the breed societies, we operate with differing rules and have variance in the management of the board meetings. It was a thrill to witness the Irish breed society being awarded the rights to host the next European tour and we wish the team all the best with the planning.

SOUTH AFRICAN REPORT FOR THE IRISH HEREFORD BREED JOURNAL 2023

Greetings go out to our colleagues in Ireland. Over more than 100 years, Hereford cattle have been a major contributor to South Africa's beef production. As Hereford breeders, we remain proud of the high standards and quality genetics our breed continuous to offer to South African commercial beef producers. Although SA Hereford breeders can take advantage of a global genetic pool from the world's second largest beef breed population, our breed today after 105 years of existence in South Africa, also is a high performance truly adapted African beef animal. Nowadays, SA Herefords have been bred to be adapted to perform under the most unpleasant climatic conditions and therefore are present throughout South Africa. They thrive from the cold Drakensberg and Eastern Cape winter conditions to the heat-stricken areas of Swaziland, the Karoo

and the Kalahari as they have the ability to develop a coat during colder winter weather and shed their coat soon after warmer weather conditions start again. Purebred herds can nowadays also be found in heavy tick infested areas of the northern parts of South Africa, where immunity of such tick-borne diseases has successfully been established in those Hereford cattle.

Thanks to the purity of the breed and due to its genetic distance from popular female lines such as Zebu type breeds and breeds indigenous to Africa, the Hereford breed is in high demand in cross breeding programs. They cross especially well with Zebu cattle and indigenous breeds in warmer climates and with other British beef- and Composite breeds in more temperate climates. Very few cattle breeds in South Africa can claim

that the foundation of their genetic and phenotypic traits is based on highly fertile, wellfleshed, mediumsized animals with a smooth summer coat, well-formed eyebrow-ridges and placings, and pigmentation around the eyes, and at the same time remain popular within feedlot conditions with their efficient production cost as well as for producing a high-

quality end product. However, besides thriving under feedlot conditions, Hereford cross calves in South Africa need to also have the ability to finish with great success from natural pastures.

Given all the quality traits the breed offers, it is no surprise that the demand for Hereford breeding stock in SA remains high, resulting in a longer-term positive outlook for the breed in South Africa. At many Hereford bull and cow sales all-time high average prices and % animals sold of total that are offered for both male and female animals are still being attained.

Our breeders further deserve praise for the speed in which our breed reached its target to gather at least 800 usable hair samples, which was necessary to allow SA Stud Book's genetic experts to continue with their work to build a set of GEBV's specifically for the SA Hereford population.

Based on the size of the population and other important scientific factors, these genotypes have now formed the core for the implementation of the first genomic breeding values (GBLUP) services for the SA Hereford Society and its members.

The SA Hereford's first genomic evaluation has

been released in June 2022, which makes the SA Hereford breed only the 5th beef breed in SA that already allows its breeders to use GBLUP values. Of special significance is also that local Hereford breeders are now empowered to use the genomic information of global Artificial Insemination bulls in the local genomic breeding value evaluations prior to a decision for imports.

Sadly, the 2022 National Hereford Championship Show had to be called off due to the Foot and Mouth disease that suddenly struck the country. SA Herefords are now busy with the arrangements for the 2023 National Championships that will take place on 3 and 4 May 2023. PJ Budler will be the judge and we are looking forward to being able to physically engage and interact again with each other after the Covid pandemic withheld us from doing so since 2020 when the world was struck by this pandemic. We also would like to extend an invitation to all Irish breeders that may want to travel to South Africa in May 2023 and join us in the week's festivities during these championships.

Wishing all fellow Irish breeders a joyful and prosperous 2023.



UK HEREFORD CATTLE SOCIETY - FROM THE DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

After the last few years being so disruptive with Covid it has been nice to get back to some form of normality and that has certainly been the case for the UK Hereford cattle society in 2022.

At our Spring show and sale in April at Shrewsbury Auction centre, bids reached £11,550 for bull Rempstone 1 Virus N598 from M Ludgate, while a new record bull average was set for 27 bulls sold to average £4,404 clearing at 79 percent. In the heifer section, a selective trade saw some impressive prices. Topping this section at £8,400 was the day's grand female champion, Normanton 1 Blue Leg 13th V555 from TD and WT Livesey, Normanton-le-Heath, Leicestershire.

Balmoral show returned to its normal May fixture in 2022 following disruption over the Covid

period, making it the first major show in 2022 for the society. Northern Irish breeders put forward a strong entry of 46 cattle from 13 different exhibitors and were pleased to welcome South African judge PJ Budler to the show to sort the line ups. Taking the supreme champion title on the day was Dorepoll 1 Sally 679 from JE an RI and W Haire, Dundrod Co Antrim. Taking the reserve supreme was Richmount 1 Treadstone from James Graham, Portadown, Co Armagh.

Over the summer we celebrated the Queens jubilee which was a great occasion and one we all relished and look back on fondly especially after the sad passing of Queen Elizabeth II.

The first of the Royal shows was the Royal Three Counties where Sky High 1 Miss Allure from

Boomer Birch, Graham Brindley and Nick Griffiths Staffordshire stood supreme, grand female and junior female champion. It was a quick turnaround for the society and then off up to The Royal Highland Show where Spartan 1 Typhoon from SC and GL Hartwight stood supreme and performance recorded interbreed champion, having already had a fruitful show season.

It is always difficult to highlight everything that is achieved at the shows but considering the last few years the number of cattle on show has been remarkable and credit must go to our members for their continued support and efforts.

To mark the 200 years of the Lewis family breeding Hereford cattle, HRH The Princess Royal visited the home farm of The Haven, Dilwyn, Herefordshire.

At the Lewis Bicentenary sale saw a number of breed records smashed by the Haven and Havenfield herds of EL Lewis and son and JW Lewis' Boycefield herd on celebrating 200 years of the Lewis family continuously breeding pedigree Hereford cattle.

With the society's official auctioneer Jonny Dymond in the rostrum, a fast-paced exchange around the ring saw bids fly to 20,000gns for Haven Thrush 74th, a September 2020-born heifer. Paying the money was New House Herefords, Hampton Bishop, Herefordshire and in doing so a new female price record was set at public auction. This powerful and correct female can be traced back 22 generations to one of the foundation cows purchased in 1850 under the Lewis ownership.

At the society and under the guidance of council we continue with our programme of modernising and trying to improve the breed. This year has been about putting the building blocks in place to move forward on several fronts in 2023. Below you can see some of the areas that we have been working on:

Genomics – Council took the decision to move



forward on this and make it available to our members.

- Linear scoring This is an assessment of an animal's traits carried out by a panel of professional independent assessors who travel to holdings over the UK and are employed by Holsteins UK.
- Work being carried out on updating our articles of association
- Updating our registration software ILR2
- On the back of our sustainability work through Dr Liz Genever, delivering initiatives to help improve the breed
- Looking to run some PR days to further develop our beef brand and retail/consumer awareness

HISTORIC HEREFORD OPPORTUNITY IN THE U.S.

WHEN THE CURRENT DROUGHT ENDS, COMMERCIAL PRODUCERS WILL LIKELY NEED TO EXPAND THE NATION'S COW HERD BY AT LEAST 2.5 MILLION HEAD.

Dedicated efforts by Hereford breeders in the United States over time have positioned the breed enviably as commercial cow-calf producers seek to incorporate more heterosis through complimentary crossbreeding.

"In my 20 years of serving the American Hereford Association (AHA), the enthusiasm of our membership has never been higher, nor the interest from the commercial industry more intense," says Jack Ward, AHA executive vice-president. "Hereford momentum in the United States is building and should continue to build given the historic opportunity at hand."

The historic opportunity has to do with two primary drivers.

First, more commercial producers are recognizing that making the national cow herd increasingly straightbred Angus came at the cost of reduced production efficiency and the associated economics. Based on various data, commercial cow herd performance has remained static or declined during the past two decades when it comes to key revenue metrics like reproductive efficiency, weaning weights and weaning weights per cow exposed.

While the increased carcass quality that came with more use of Angus genetics was necessary to bolster consumer beef demand, more producers are recognizing the need to maintain carcass quality while shoring up production efficiency.

The second part of the historic Hereford opportunity has to do with raw numbers. When 2023 begins, there will likely be approximately 3% fewer beef cows year over

year in the U.S. inventory — about 29.2 million head. That would be 2.5 million fewer cows than the most recent peak of 31.7 million in 2019. While economics are partly to blame, widespread, persistent drought has been the primary impetus of national beef cow liquidation.

When the current drought ends, supply fundamentals suggest enough economic incentive for cow-calf producers to build back by at least 2.5 million cows and the bulls necessary to breed them. "Considering narrow profit margins, even as depleted cattle supplies drive cattle prices higher, increased use of heterosis is the logical solution," Ward says. "More than logical, you can easily argue it's necessary for economic sustainability."

The perfect fit

Experience across decades and reams of research document the advantages of direct and maternal heterosis.

Inherent genetic advantages make Hereford the most powerful crossbreeding component. In fact, the vision of AHA's new five-year strategic plan is to establish Hereford genetics as the essential component of the U.S. beef cow herd. Past AHA research projects demonstrated the economic value associated with direct and maternal heterosis in Hereford-sired, F1 black baldy females, compared to straightbred black Angus peers. "Documented advantages include fertility (pregnancy rate), pounds of calf weaned per cow exposed, feedlot feed efficiency and cost of gain, cow feed efficiency (pasture) and net return per calf," according to Shane Bedwell, AHA chief operating officer and director of breed improvement.

Plus, Hereford are the least related of the Bos Taurus breeds, according to the U.S. meat Animal Research Center. That means Hereford come with added crossbreeding punch.

AHA continues to document the advantages. As an example, a multi-year research project at Oklahoma State University documented that Hereford-sired black baldy females consume about 2 pounds less moderate-quality pasture forage per day, while carrying more body condition, when compared to straight bred black Angus peers. That equates to about one acre less forage per year. Bedwell also points to AHA's current multi-year research project with the University of Illinois, which carries previous knowledge about maternal heterosis a step further. The project compares Hereford-sired, black baldy cows to straightbred black Angus peers for economically relevant traits such as conception rate, calving rate and pounds of calf weaned per cow exposed. But the project also measures individual cow feed intake prior to breeding and during lactation to establish maintenance energy requirements. Additionally, steer progeny of cows in the project will be fed and finished, providing a comprehensive assessment of values and efficiencies from conception through slaughter.

Ultimately, the project goal is to develop a global economic model to quantify direct and maternal heterosis advantages of the Hereford-sired, F1 baldy female.

Sustainability and genetics

Hereford's efficiency advantages magnify the breed's opportunity when it comes to environmental sustainability and social license. "Sustainability is not a nice-to-have anymore; it's a need-to-have," says Kim Stackhouse-Lawson, Ph.D., director of Colorado State University's (CSU) AgNext, a research collaborative developing sustainable solutions for agriculture.

"Yes, producers have been here for generations, but today we have to say, 'We've been here for generations and here's how we continue to improve and continue to care.' The proof points in today's society are expected, whether that's fair or not." Stackhouse-Lawson explains most of the pressure on U.S. cattle and beef currently comes from concerns about climate change, specifically the level of greenhouse gas (GHG) produced by the industry.



"We know cattle are natural up-cyclers. We also know how much more efficient U.S. beef production has become over time in terms of producing more beef with fewer cows on less land. The American cattle producer is the most efficient in the world," Ward says. "But we also know the global population is expected to grow by almost 2 billion by 2050. So, how do we become more efficient and how do we, from a genetic standpoint, affect overall sustainability?"

The AHA launched a collaborative research project with CSU and AgNext during fiscal year 2022 to find answers. Specifically, the research aims to enhance the understanding of the genetic differences in seedstock relative to enteric methane production - a byproduct of rumen fermentation - and nitrogen excretion. Both contribute to greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and the carbon footprint of cattle.

"Documenting the relationship between traits associated with efficiency - Hereford advantages - and GHG emissions is the logical next step for the breed and the industry," Ward says.

Bedwell explains the project leverages decades

of AHA research and member data, including individual feed intake records collected through the National Reference Sire Program (NRSP) since 2010. It uses the unbiased reporting and added prediction accuracy stemming from AHA's Whole Herd Total Performance Records (TPRTM), which was established in 2001.

"Because of leadership foresight and breeder commitment to progress, the Hereford breed is poised to represent the entire beef industry as leaders in the sustainability arena," according to Bedwell.

Expected outcomes of the multi-year project include characterization of Hereford's sustainability advantages associated with absolute production of methane and nitrogen, as well as selection tools enabling producers to select for less GHG emissions.

All of these opportunities build on expanded Hereford market share in recent years, based on AHA memberships, registrations, inventory in the TPR program and transfers of registered Hereford bulls to commercial cow-calf producers.



The average price paid in 2021 for Hereford bulls reported by AHA was \$5,745. That was \$1,079 more (+23%) than the average price five years earlier. Keep in mind, the 2021 bull price average accounts for 6,280 bulls, one of the largest volumes ever reported by AHA. These prices and volume will likely be similar when 2022 annual data is available.

Helping young producers lead

Hereford breeders in the United States are also strongly positioned to expand marketshare because of AHA's long-term focus on providing Hereford youth with the opportunity to learn more about the cattle and beef industries as they develop leadership skills. The National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) is widely regarded as offering more opportunity than any other junior breed organization in the nation.

Consider that the Hereford Youth Foundation of America - funded by Hereford breeders - awards nearly \$200,000 in scholarships each year. Another example is growing participation in the Fed Steer Shootout, which gives Hereford juniors a chance to learn about the cattle feeding and beef packing sectors, while feeding their own cattle at a commercial feedlot - HRC Feedyards in Scott City, Kan. - to see how their genetics perform. As well, depending on the year, the NJHA hosts the largest or second largest junior heifer show in the world.

"We're proud of NJHA and the breeder support behind the organization and its activities," Ward explains. "While those efforts continue, our AHA Board of Directors is also focused on expanding opportunities for young breeders, those who leave the ranks of NJHA and are just beginning their professional careers."

Currently, AHA is designing a leadership program for that specific segment of the organization's membership.

International Hereford friends will have a chance to see and hear more about Hereford in United States during the World Hereford Conference. It is scheduled for Oct. 23-26, 2025 in Kansas City, Mo. with exciting pre-conference and post-conference tour options.

"Hereford breeders in the United States are commonly recognized for their family spirit. If you have anything to do with Hereford, you're part of the family," Ward says. "I've discovered the same thing is true of Hereford breeders across the world, who have extended such amazing hospitality to our staff and members over time. "We're looking forward to sharing that same kind of hospitality with those attending the 2025 World Hereford Conference."














e have continued to invest in our beef genetics sustainability program. Following on from the initial purchase of three bulls in the first year of the program,



MAYO FARMER AWARDED IRISH HEREFORD PRIME FARMER OF THE YEAR FOR 2022

Lorraine Crowe combines a career in nursing with her role as a farmer on her family farm in Hollymount, Co. Mayo. Lorraine introduced a calf to beef system onto her farm ten years ago and now rears around fifty calves per year, she has been a member of Irish Hereford Prime since 2014. The beef producer group chose Lorraine as Farmer of Year for 2022 due to the high percentage of her cattle that consistently make an R grade, excellent daily liveweight gain and her commitment to, and advocacy of Herefords on her farm.

Almost all the calves bought for the farm are Hereford crosses, Lorraine explains why she feels they are easier fleshed and come into higher weights when compared with other breeds.

"I happened to buy a few Herefords eight or ten years ago and I just really liked them. They are so docile and so easy to manage and work with. The calves are out on grass from an early age and the paddock system that I put in place is used to maintain grass quality."

Lorraine believes that this is the key to animal performance and good daily liveweight gain.

The animals are moved every two to three days



and Lorraine has used pigtail posts and electric fencing to create and manage paddocks in the past. Although she has plans to erect more permanent fencing in the future to further utilise the high levels of grass grown on the farm.

Lorraine likes to keep her winter season as short as possible by giving her weanlings access to the outdoors along with the shelter of a shed for supplementary feeding. She aims to close off part of the farm by November 1st, with housing starting around December 1st, to ensure that she has grass available for early grazing the following March. This year was more challenging than usual as Lorraine had less shed space due to not having a rented shed in the mix any longer. This meant


that more of the animals had to be outwintered but fortunately for her the Hereford breed is suited to the outdoors and is well adapted to the Irish weather.

The sheds that are in use this year are bedded with straw and the animals are fed on high quality silage with a high level of protein particularly for younger growing stock. The animals will be put out to grass again by St. Patrick's Day to ensure they get the best of the early grass. Lorraine believes in cutting good silage early in the season and aims to have it done by the first week in June. The ground she uses for the silage is grazed off ahead of closing it for the first cut.

When purchasing calves Lorraine likes a big strong healthy calf and for this reason, she takes age into account. Some of the calves purchased for the farm come from local dairy farms, while others are sourced from Co. Kerry where Lorraine tends to have a larger choice of Hereford calves to select from.

Strong attention to detail and a high level of care ensures that calf health is good on the Hollymount farm. Lorraine's background in nursing means that she understands how important health management is. All of the animals on the farm are weighed in September ahead of finishing, but also to monitor performance and divide the calves into different groups. Most of the Hereford heifers and steers are slaughtered at 19-22 months of age with a very high percentage of these Hereford cross animals grading as Rs. She supplies her cattle to Kepak Athleague and consistently meets the required carcass specification to achieve the top bonuses available. There are currently a portion of her steers sold live as forward stores, due to the lack of shed space. Lorraine plans to change this approach next year by building another shed with the assistance of a 60% TAMS grant.

2023 will see a further area of the farm reseeded to incorporate clover to reduce the overall nitrogen requirement while at the same time helping to

reduce Green House Gas emissions. To add to this environmental focus, Lorraine has recently joined the ACRES programme with several important topics being focused on. These include, traditional stonewall maintenance, low input pasture along with an area that has been set aside for geese and swans.

As the third generation to work the farm in Hollymount, Lorraine would like it to stay in the family in the future. Her Dad is still actively involved, and her nephew and two nieces also love to help out. Lorraine enjoys passing on her knowledge and is delighted to see them and in particular her nephew's enthusiasm for rearing calves.

"I love to see the changes and the good performance of Hereford animals; it is hugely satisfying for all of us to watch them thrive and grow."



SWITCHING FROM DAIRY TO DAIRY-BEEF IN CO. CORK

Proinnsias Creedon took over the family farm situated in the heart of Gaeltacht Mhúscraí, Co. Cork, from his father in 2013.

The Creedon's farm was a dairy farm until 2010, but then gradually transitioned towards finishing a small number of beef cattle.

Since then, Proinnsias has established a store-tobeef production system and now finishes 70-80 heifers each year. Until recently, Proinnsias had purchased all animals at 12-18 months of age and finished them by 24 months of age.

During Covid-19 restrictions in 2020, Proinnsias and his wife, Máire, decided to begin rearing dairy-beef cross calves. This brought about a great opportunity for their young family, allowing them to be more hands-on with the farm.

Hereford cattle

The Creedons choose Hereford sired heifer calves when selecting dairy-beef crosses to purchase. "I find Herefords to be the perfect breed for my needs," said Proinnsias.

"They are a calm animal – which is ideal when I've a young family around the farm – they finish easily and can be kept for a shorter time."

In their first year rearing dairy-beef calves, the Creedon family successfully reared 16 calves. This encouraged them to expand year-on-year and now the Creedons hope to raise 40 dairy-beef cross calves in 2022.

"Herefords are a great breed to have around the farm, especially when you've a young family running about," Proinnsias added.

Along with their calves, the Creedon family also

purchase groups of Hereford heifers between 12-18 months of age throughout each year and aim to finish them all by 24 months of age.

Family-run farm

Alongside his farm work, Proinnsias works as a maths and Irish teacher. Proinnsias is thrilled that his family has a great interest in helping out with the cattle.

"My three sons really love the animals, with one taking a particular interest in the Herefords," he said.

"The first thing he says when new animals arrive is 'how many of mine came?'

"If they aren't Herefords, he doesn't want anything to do with them."

Sustainable farming

In 2021, Proinnsias became a member of Future Beef which is associated with the Signpost farm programme with Teagasc.

This is a five-year programme which showcases science-based technologies that can reduce agricultural emissions.

The farms that are involved in the programme act as 'hubs' for the Signpost advisory campaign and create a national network of farms where carbon sequestration in grassland and hedgerows can be examined.

"This will further educate and equip me to farm alongside the natural environment while doing my part in reducing overall emissions from agriculture," Proinnsias added.

Grassland management

Soil health and fertility is very important to the Creedon's farming system. They focus on liming regularly to maintain optimum soil pH levels across the farm.

The Creedons also spread protected urea to farm more sustainably from an environmental perspective.

"Grass measuring is a very powerful tool for me to manage the growth of quality grass and silage on my farm. Through grass measuring, I can apply

fertiliser only where needed and at the optimal time," said Proinnsias.


"Essentially, I have a nutrient-management plan for my farm and it's an ideal way to bring everything together.

"The Hereford breed compliments the way I try to farm. Keeping costs to a minimum, while maintaining performance at grass," he added. "Their ability to mature at an earlier age with minimal additional inputs really suits my farming system."





Richard Raftice is a young dairy farmer based in Mullinavat, Co. Kilkenny. Richard is the seventh generation to farm there, with the Raftice's association dating back to the 1700s.

Historically, there have been Hereford animals on this farm for generations. Dairy farming and finishing Hereford beef cattle were the two main enterprises on the farm over the years.

Richard now milks 240 dairy cows, sells some of their progeny as pedigree Friesian bulls for breeding and some as replacement heifers. All Hereford progeny are now sold off farm as calves.

When Richards father passed away fifteen years ago it meant that Richard took over the farm full-time at the young age of twenty-two.

"I was just fresh out of Kildalton Agricultural College at the time and I have learned a lot since," he said.

This young farmer has very little interest in tractors



or machinery with his major driver being breeding animals and improving year on year.

Richard believes a healthy work-life balance is important and he is heavily involved with his local Mullinavat GAA Club where he previously played, but now coaches their junior hurling team.

The farm

Like many dairy farmers, Richard invested in a new milking parlour and more cow accommodation when milk quotas were removed in 2015 and was ready to expand. Making full use of existing



facilities, the sheds that were used for finishing the beef cattle are now used for the Hereford stock bulls and cull cows.

Richard highlights that the land type would be "quite dry which allows cows to be let out to grass early, reducing the workload and disease pressure, which is important at that very busy time of year". "Calving begins on the farm on the February 1, and as soon as the first dozen cows calve down, the aim is for them to go out together on grass by day and night, obviously weather dependent," he said. Richard is an advocate of reseeding which sees a section of the farm being reseeded annually—with emphasis remaining on grass quality and soil fertility.

Both soil sampling and silage testing is carried out regularly on farm to keep an eye on soil nutrients and also to review the mineral levels in the forage on the farm to ensure that his cows are eating the best possible quality feed year-round.

Richard is also involved in breeding and selling high genetic merit Pedigree Friesian bulls. These bulls are bred from high economic breeding index (EBI) sires crossed with the cows he believes are best suited for breeding.

Last year's herd performance was 520kg milk solids from a predominately grass diet.

Animal welfare is paramount on the Raftice farm. Richard makes sure to put a big emphasis on having well-fed calves in a draft free shed. Richard also believes calves should not be moved off farm until they are ready to do so.

Why Hereford?

There has always been a Hereford bull on the family farm and despite the dairy enterprise having expanded in recent years, Richard still appreciates beef sired calves of a higher quality.

However, Richard said "the mere fact that there has been Herefords around here for at least 80 years is not the only reason that we continue to use Hereford genetics, in fact there is much more to it" including:

1. Calving ease which is a major benefit especially during a very busy time on the farm;

- 2. Gestation is very good in comparison to most other beef breeds;
- 3. "Temperament of Hereford bulls makes them easier managed around cows and in the milking parlour, which often contributes to greater longevity for a bull in a herd," according to Richard;
- 4. Calf vigour and hardiness that leads on to a healthy more active calf; and
- 5. Hereford calves are always very saleable as the buyer knows what they are getting.

Breeding on the farm

Breeding top quality stock on the farm is the main priority. Richard uses both Friesian and Hereford sires on his cows and heifers.

He currently has three Hereford stock bulls running but also uses Hereford artificial insemination (AI). High EBI sires are used on cows which are best suited for breeding high EBI Friesian bulls that are sold on to other dairy farmers. Richard also breeds his own replacement heifers from select cows in the herd and uses Friesian AI straws on these.

Richard doesn't focus too much on the DBI index nor the calving figure when choosing a Hereford



bull, as he feels the correct feeding of his Friesian cows will eliminate most issues.

The main breeding values he uses when choosing a Hereford bull for the farm are carcase figures and overall beef indexes.

The Future

Going forward, Richard plans to maintain cow numbers and continue to sell pedigree Friesian bulls with a high EBI for breeding.

He also plans to continue to sell high quality Hereford calves off farm at two to three weeks of age or whenever they are strong enough to do so.
